Passing of Mr. Hays.

The death of David H. Hays, news of which has been received here today, will be deeply regretted by all who knew him in this city. In his death Prince Rupert loses one of her best citizens.

It is a great work and the Daily News is glad to be able to add its quota of praise to that of others who know more intimately of the work being done there.

Better Condition In Few Months.

The general opinion in business circles, which are likely to be well informed, is that by late spring or early summer there will be an improvement in general business. Already there are signs that the worst may be past. There will undoubtedly be lower prices in a few lines, but on the whole it may be said that there is likely to be greater stability from this time on. Any downward price movements will be slow after this.

All reports from the east are that a better and more hopeful spirit prevails. Factories are clearing off their surplus stock and are preparing to reopen and many have already reopened. Some did not close but simply reduced the output.

The unemployment situation is still bad, but there will be busier times in the very near future. The slump has hit a good many people hard, but most of the business people of Prince Rupert are in fairly good financial condition and there is likely to be less disturbance to business here than in most places.

Proposal Was Made To Cancel War Debts.

The British Chancellor of the Exchequer says there was a proposal made to the American Government to cancel all war debts. All were fighting for the same cause and the British gave of the manhood and womanhood of the country to an extent unknown in the United States. They bore the brunt of the fighting for years before the Americans came in and the least that country could now do would be to help pay the financial debt. The debt of blood can never be paid.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

APPLICATIONS FOR GRAZING PERMITS
UNDER GRAZING ACT 1919.

Applications for permits to graze live-stock on the Crown range within each Grazing District of the Province of British Columbia during the grazing season of 1921 must be filed with the District Foresters at Cariboo, Cranbrook, Fort George, Kamloops, Nelson, Prince Rupert, Vancouver, Vernon or with the Commissioner of Grazing, Department of Lands at Victoria, B.C., on or before March 31, 1921.

Blank forms upon which to submit applications may be obtained from the District Foresters at the above named places or from the Department of Lands at Victoria.

The grazing of livestock on the Crown range without permit constitutes trespass, prohibited by law.

NEW YORKERS ON BIG FIGHT

Say Canadians Trying to Snatch
Great American Industry

THOUSANDS SAVING
TO WITNESS BATTLE

NEW YORK, Feb. 5. — The negotiations now under way between Tex Rickard and C. F. Graham, of Montreal, regarding the staging of the Dempsey-Carpentier bout in the Canadian city have been the subject of a good deal of comment in the New York papers. The majority of local sports writers express the view that Rickard will not definitely accept the proposition which has been put up to him by the Montreal promoters, at least until he has exhausted every effort to make it possible to hold the fight in New York. Meanwhile Rickard's negotiations with Mr. Graham and his associates have aroused widespread interest in Montreal's possibilities as a battleground for the fistie stars and the advantages which the Quebec city would offer to those who find the Volstead type of beverages not entirely to their taste.

The New York Times in a re-posal to hold the big fight in cent editorial linked up the pro-Montreal in a jocular vein with the Fordney Emergency Tariff Bill which would exclude Canadian wheat from the United States by imposing a prohibitive tariff. This article, which was headed, "Our Lady of the Blows," declared that the Fordney bill has "stirred some of our Canadian friends into natural threats of commercial retaliation."

Snatch Great Industry

"If we won't let their stuff come in, they'll keep ours out, snap their fingers at geography, and buy of the British manufacturer," continues the Times. "Now Canadian enterprise seeks to snatch from us a great national and international industry. The commercial exchange of thumps between John Dempsey, the American hero, and Georges Carpentier, the paladin of Gaul, is to be transferred to Dominion soil if the Northern grumblers of American exportation of these heavyweights can trade have their way. The means heavyweight finance. The romantic sum of \$700,000 is said to be the consideration. If the two egregious strikers ever do collide in Canada, what an amount of American money will go from here to there!"

Thousands Saving

"Thousands of citizens are saving, no doubt some will even go so far as to steal, money for the purpose of witnessing the most expensive transaction in the history of slugging. There have been plenty of great fighters. To none has so lofty a financial program been offered. The price of a seat is a week's wages to the salaried. Who can calculate the amount of hotel bills, the hire of taxis, the wild American plunge into the sea of Scotch? Who can reckon the mighty aggregate of American assets that will be lost to the United States. The exportation of this memorable 'mill' may have a notable effect on Canadian exchange. Yet nobody raises a finger to protect our home industry, Dempsey the huge. Nobody thinks of grabbing Carpentier, an imported industry to be fostered here, and of detaining the fat profits that might be made from his labors in the home market. With an edifying altruism, Americans will watch the removal, if it takes place, of these two great sources of wealth, play joyfully at the new game of enrich and await with satisfaction and relief the interplay of battering 'dukes.'"
