Ald. Casey Offers Motion to Council on Economic Matters-Laid on Table For Two Weeks

Ald. Casey placed before the city council last night a motion expressing regret at the failure of the recent Imperial economic conference at Ottawa to commit itself on the matter of stabilization of silver, commending the Dominion government for resuming trade relations with Soviet Russia and expressing! the opinion that Imperial trade agreements would not solve the economic problems facing the world while the masses of the workers remained idle.

After a rather lengthy silence, Ald. Casey's motion was finally seconded by Ald. Rudderham so that it might come before the council for discussion. Ald. Rudderham stated that he was in approval with the resolution except for the clause dealing with stabilization of silver.

Ald. Casey held that the Imperial conference had done as little as it possibly could. The delegates had spent a lot of money, had a good time and had gone away with a few trade treaties which would do the world as a whole no good. The conference, indeed, had been a waste of time and money. What was needed in the world today were markets. and these could only be provided by the masses of workers who were now starving and had nothing to do. The council was welcome to lay the motion on the table or revise if it so wished, Ald Casey said.
