Permanent Grounds
For Fall Fairs.

The directors of the fall fair are making an effort to provide permanent grounds for the holding of the fair. That is why they are putting on the big hayseed dance tonight and monster tombola. Everyone who buys a ticket for the big event is helping on the movement for providing a suitable place in which to hold the fair. It is a worthy move and for that reason the Daily News is giving it unusual prominence.

There should easily be a thousand tickets sold for the tombola and those who hold tickets may also attend the dance if they wish. The articles to be given as prizes were donated by local merchants. It is for the citizens generally to respond by patronizing the affair and making it a great success.

Reserve Still
On Coal Lands.

The report that the reserve had been lifted from the Fraser Lake coal lands seems to have been premature. Word received in the city is to the effect that the reserve is not yet lifted. It seems a pity that the coal mining industry, which means so much to Prince Rupert as well as to the people of Fraser Lake and to the railway, should not be allowed to proceed. Doubtless something will be done in the near future toward lifting the embargo.

Lord Findlay
And Canada.

The appointment of Lord Findlay as chairman of the Royal Commission to enquire into the embargo on cattle importation to Britain will be, for more than one reason, of special interest to Canada. Lord Findlay will be 79 years of age in July, and his acceptance of the position is a further proof of how the veterans of the judiciary are ready in the present congested state of the nation's business to take on additional duties.

Lord Findlay, for some years before accepting the office of Lord Chancellor, appeared in practically every important Canadian appeal which came before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, yet it is less than two years ago since he made his first visit to the Dominion. He had a most cordial reception wherever he went, and delivered addresses in Montreal and Winnipeg which received the most respectful attention throughout the Dominion. In conversation with a representative of the Canadian Associated Press on his return to England he referred in the terms of the warmest gratitude to the great courtesy, kindness and hospitality extended to him in Canada. "I have brought back with me a vivid sense of the great future in store for Canada," his lordship said. "I did not get further west than Winnipeg, but was most deeply impressed with the immensity of the natural resources of the country that await development, and I cannot doubt the Dominion is destined to play a great part in the history of the world. This impression is deepened by all I heard of the west, and its boundless possibilities."

Navy of Empire
In Future.

Writing to the Canadian Associated Press on what he terms the present naval crisis, Admiral Sir Cyprian Bridge remarks that until the last war our primacy on the sea was generally acquiesced in by great foreign powers. This of itself is proof that the Empire was not suspected of aggressive tendencies. It was seen to be what it really was, viz., an essentially defensive arrangement. The United Kingdom was obviously an insular state and, as the British Empire grew up, it was plain to everyone that the communications between its parts were maritime. Even the vast Dominion of Canada, with its thousands of miles of land frontier, has a long coast line on each side of two great oceans. What their armies were to the leading continental states of Europe the navy was to the British Empire. It is a truth admitting of easy demonstration that there was no foreign country too great to derive benefit from the international position and relative strength of that navy. Now it is no longer the navy of Great Britain; it is the navy of the British Empire, a name by which it ought always to be called.
