BRINGING UP FATHER**COAST TRADERS OUT OF RUPERT**

Recent Search for Escaped Prisoners Gives Local Police Some Ideas.

As a result of the recent close watch that has been made of craft passing in and out of the harbor in the search for E. Michelson, who escaped from the city lock-up on Saturday evening, the local police are evolving some theories as to the way "coast trading" of liquor between the port and Alaska is carried on.

The larger boats, it is believed, do not carry with liquor at all from this port. Instead they come here and place their orders and then, leaving the harbor, lie near some of the islands nearby and await delivery by smaller boats which are not required to clear.

There are several high powered boats in the trade, it is believed, and these develop a speed that make them nigh impossible to overtake. To successfully combat this illicit trade it would require patrol boats of high speed and fully armed.

DOING MORE WORK AT SWIMMING POOL

Volunteer Workers to Give Another Day to Improving Bathing Facilities for Children.

At a meeting of the swimming club held last night in the police court room at the city hall, it was decided to hold another working bee next Sunday morning to complete the work of cleaning out the swimming pool at the Salt Lakes where the children bathe so that when the sand is put in it will be in better condition than last year.

The Oh Baby will take the workers over at 9:30 Sunday morning and those willing to go are asked to notify E. R. Tabrum or Cyril Westaway beforehand so that provisions may be made for them.

Blast Stumps.

A tag day is to be held on Saturday to raise funds with which to complete the work of improving the swimming pool, that being the most important work undertaken this year.

Left for South This Morning with Ore, Lumber and Salmon

The steamer Prince Albert, which arrived from Stewart yesterday afternoon at 2:30 and left again this morning for the south, had on board 200 tons of ore from the Premier gold mine.

This was loaded on the steamer by half a dozen men who have not joined in the strike which has now become almost general as far as the Premier is concerned. The steamer also brought south about fifty passengers, many of whom were strikers leaving the place. During the night before she left for the south the Albert loaded salmon at the Tucks Inlet cannery and also 60,000 feet of lumber from the Georgetown mill consigned for England.

In the Letter Box**TOURIST'S PARADISE.**

Editor Daily News—When thousands of people are looking around for a place in which to spend their summer holidays, the opportunity is afforded for rest, recreation and profit, with the accompanying pleasure of visiting some of the beauty spots in this northern country.

Innumerable islands are scattered along the Pacific within a few miles of Prince Rupert. There camping parties troll for the king salmon during the 24 hours of daylight, while their families may camp alongside some pleasant stream where the fresh and salt water bathing facilities are of the best.

Salmon Trolling.

For some years hundreds of trollers have been making a good living for some months, disposing of their catches to the packing boats sent out from Prince Rupert. All that is needed is a camping outfit, a supply of provisions and a boat. It matters little whether the boat is driven by man-power or by gasoline. With no wild animals on these islands and the fact that the beaches are of sand without danger from depth of water, the idea of giving children the advantage of an outing will be apparent.

On Graham Island.

The months of June and July are long and the weather pleasant. There is no doubt about the catching of the huge salmon, which disport off the north end of Graham Island in large numbers. Wood and water for culinary purposes is in abundance. Why people will travel to Alaska to view glaciers and snow-clad hills is a mystery when we have so many attractive spots endowed by nature right at our own doors. Our inlets are almost landlocked and extend many miles, almost cutting through the largest of the islands. We have sandy beaches on the sea coast that compare with Florida.

Hotels Needed.

Should some large corporation erect hotels for summer visitors they will attract many seeking places where people may enjoy all that is lacking in the cities and towns.

These comparatively unknown islands will be the future northern resort of the people of the Pacific, offering inducements that cannot be obtained in any other part of the world.
