Many people in southern British Columbia and in other parts of the world are looking northward. This summer the Dairyman's Association of British Columbia are to have their summer meeting at Vanderhoof. The town is the centre of a dairying district and a successful creamery is conducted there.

Pattullo's Suggestion In Regard to Power.

Mr. Pattullo told the Rotary Club yesterday that he had been urging the promoters of the proposed new pulp mill to develop a large waterpower in this neighborhood with the object of providing power for their own mills and also possibly of supplying the city of Prince Rupert, if the city decided it was prepared to purchase.

The Daily News has constantly urged the desirability of trying to secure power here and plenty of it so that local industries may be supplied at low commercial rates. This would be a great aid to the city and her future development.

Get Big Interests To Back City.

Prince Rupert has not for many years known what it is to have any big interest backing the place and trying to help it. The city has played a lone hand and the result has not been altogether successful.

There are people who are always opposed to corporations or people who do business in a big way. These are the people, however, who are in a position to push Prince Rupert to the front. They can turn business our way and by their influence capital will come here for investment.

Result of Playing The Lone Hand.

We have seen what it meant to play the lone hand when all the big interests connected with the Dominion Government have been against us. We have wanted improvements, but the interests have said "no."

We want to forge ahead. Stagnation is not good for any of us. Living in a small and isolated place we are apt to become small in our outlook and isolated in our ideas.

PECK DEFENDS GOVERNMENT

Says is Sure Policy of Minister of Marine will Win Out

A recent copy of Hansard shows that Colonel Peck presided over the committee of the House of Commons in discussing the marine department in committee of supply. On that occasion he defended the Dominion Government. After saying they should not be blamed for the decline of freight rates and urging better progress, he said:

"I am not going to carry on the discussion in defence of the policy of the minister, because we do not need to do that. It is very easy to tear things down, but it is very hard to build them up. I am quite sure that the minister's policy is going to win out, and I am prepared to stand behind it. I do not care what gibes are thrown at me about my not crossing the floor of the House. I am as good a free trader as the hon. member for Red Deer, absolutely, and if I had a little square constituency down in Alberta, I might talk a whole lot of free trade and nothing else, but I am a practical politician. I am going to fight for free trade where we can get it, but I challenge my hon. friend from Red Deer to say if he can get it from the official position in this House."

Looks In Vain

"Take the leader of the Opposition (Mr. MacKenzie King), or the hon. member for Shelburne and Queen's (Mr. Fielding), or the hon. member for Quebec East (Mr. Lapointe) or the hon. member for Beauce (Mr. Beland)—all these hon. gentlemen have made high protectionist speeches in this House. I look in vain for free traders on the other side of the House."

"If any hon. gentleman can show me where we can get genuine free trade or a policy that will work towards free trade I will be with him, but in the meantime you will have to show me. I always listen to my hon. friend from Red Deer with the utmost respect, and I challenge him to say whether he has any more sympathy than I have with the speeches from the official Opposition."

FOUR WERE GUESTS LOCAL ROTARY CLUB

Short Addresses from Men Building New Court House Here.

In addition to the speaker of the day, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, the Rotary Club yesterday had as luncheon guests at the St. Regis rooms four of the men interested in the building of the new court house. These were A. C. McDougall, of the firm of McDougall & McNeill; H. Whittaker, architect; Mitchell Albert, of Vancouver, and M. P. McCaffery of this city.

Messrs. McDougall, Whittaker and Albert each made a few remarks. Mr. McDougall said he was present when Mr. Pattullo put up the fight in the Legislature for the money for the building. He was a good scrapper. Mitchell Albert spoke of the splendid work the Rotary Clubs were doing in Vancouver and other places. The firm building the court house was Albert, McCaffery, McDougall & McNeill. In the matter of providing supplies any local firm would have the preference.

Mr. Whittaker said the building would be a fine one and when it was outgrown an addition could be made as the plans provided for that. The presence of such a building would put Prince Rupert in a different class.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of low water.
