

T. D. Pattullo Addresses the Prince Rupert Rotary Club on Problems of Day

Before the Rotary Club yesterday, Hon. T. D. Pattullo spoke particularly of the plans of the promoters of the new pulp plant in regard to this place. Not only were they proposing to install a pulp plant with a paper mill to follow, but there was an engineer coming here to consider the possibility of installing a power plant. This man was an eminent authority.

Mr. Pattullo said he had urged on the Emerson people the desirability of developing power here and the visit of the engineer was the result. He had urged the development of power to sell to the city, if the city so desired. Had the power situation been settled several years ago, there would have been double the present population in Prince Rupert today. When the people here were in need of help it would have been a great advantage to have had powerful interests helping.

Moral Fibre.

Dealing with Government affairs, Mr. Pattullo expressed the opinion that it was more difficult to conduct the affairs of the country now than during the war. At that time all were bent on one purpose. Today everybody was disturbed. The public mind was unsettled. Some public men were very much worried over the situation and he, personally, was not sure that it did not mean the breaking up of civilization. There was a looseness such as had never been before, both in private and public life. Nations, like many individuals, were deeply in debt and moral fibre was breaking down. This was partly due to the effort to show that capital and labor were antagonistic to each other.

Some people thought nationalization of industry was the only way out of the difficulty, but he thought this would be turning the hands of the clock backward. He was more inclined to pin his faith to profit sharing.

Youth of Country.

Mr. Pattullo suggested several ways in which the Rotary Clubs might aid in bringing about a better condition. He urged that they use their influence with the growing youth of the country, the boys who were just about ready to step into our shoes. An endeavor should be made to inculcate ideas of right and high moral standards. He wondered if the young people were receiving proper moral inspiration. If they were not, there would be chaos. The situation was serious and institutions, such as the Rotary Club, could exercise a stable influence. They should be progressive but they should avoid rocking the boat for fear of upsetting it.

Load of Debt.

Provincially they were suffering from the load of debt. The Pacific Great Eastern Railway was the fly in the ointment. The remedy was to get rid of the railroad and to formulate an immigration policy. Settling the country would give employment. Every human was an asset. There must be more people here in order to develop the industries. He suggested that the Government would have to pay more and more attention to immigration.

Pattullo said everyone would be glad the building of the court house was going ahead. The starting of the work showed the confidence the Provincial Government had in the place and also his own confidence. For himself he had very great confidence in Prince Rupert. He had said many hopeful things in regard to the city, but never anything he did not believe. He had never had more confidence in the place than today. As he went around he saw building going on and he found everyone optimistic. The boats coming north were crowded and this looked like progress.

Pulp Contract.

The owners of the Emerson mill were under contract with the Provincial Government. Mr. Pattullo said, to begin construction on the new pulp mill not later than April of next year. The Government took action on his initiative to help get the mill installed here. What they wanted was industries. It would help the town and add to the population. The company, he might say, had still more ambitious plans than those already announced. They proposed to put in a paper mill and it was quite probable they might establish a power plant.

Trunk Road.

Speaking of the possibility of getting a road built leading out of the city, Mr. Pattullo said he had been among the first to agitate for such a road and also one to the top of the hill. A Highway Bill had been passed by the Legislature which provided for the construction of main highways in the province. They had an excellent argument for getting road work done here, for the Government collected motor licenses here and yet there was no provincial road on which they could drive. The money from the licenses was spent on roads in the south.

Perhaps This Year.

Mr. Pattullo said he had during the discussion on the appropriation for the court house, pointed out that \$1,200,000 had been realized from the sale of lots and taken south and spent there. It was the feeling of dissatisfaction over such things as this which gave rise to the movement for dividing the province. He thought it was a very good move to accentuate better treatment. They should have better representation in the north. He wanted to tell them the north was very much in the public eye, for the south knew the north would some day pay off the debt of the province. He could not say whether any work would be done this year. He knew they wanted a trunk road and a start might be made on it.

Jealous of North.

Mr. Pattullo said he had been all over the province and each constituency fancied itself not well treated. The south was jealous of the north. He had no doubt this was the richest portion of British Columbia and Prince Rupert, which was midway between north and south, should prosper. In closing Mr. Pattullo said he
