NEW SCHOOL IS GIVEN A NAME

Will Commemorate Man Who Gave His Life Attempting Save Children.

"Sergeant William Booth School," that was the name that was chosen for the new school at Hays Cove Circle by the school board last night on motion of Trustee Mrs. E. V. Ling, seconded by Trustee J. C. McLennan. Several local societies had communications before the board recommending this name, and it was embodied in the motion deciding on the name that these societies erect a suitable tablet at the school explaining the name and setting forth the circumstances under which it had been chosen.

There were letters from the Sons of England, Great War Veterans' Association, Loyal Orange Lodge, Daughters and Maids of England, Knights of Pythias and Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks. The Sons of England had a delegation present consisting of F. J. Fuller, A. Silversides, J. Day Bell, E. A. Woods and George Hill to impress the advisability of selecting the name.

Mr. Woods and Mr. Hill addressed the board, the former emphasizing that the people of the city were practically unanimous in the choice of the name and that they were paying for the school. Mr. Hill told of the moral lesson that the selection would always bring to the children in commemorating the name of a man whose death had resulted from an attempt to save the lives of little children.

There was some discussion among the members of the board. Mr. Patmore said he would not favor the name unless there was a tablet to explain it. Mr. McLennan felt that if it were named "William Booth" some confusion might arise as that was the name of the founder of the Salvation Army. Dr. Kerwin favored the name and had in mind the naming of the school after some hero of the war among whom he mentioned the names of Frank Holland and Adair Gares. Finally Mrs. Ling suggested the name Sergeant William Booth which would avoid confusion. This was selected.

Formal Opening Later. The matter of a formal opening of the new school was then discussed. Several functions to go with the opening were suggested such as the presentation of the Halsey Memorial Scholarship to Cedric Duncan, the presentation of the tablet and a concert. It was decided to announce that the school was open and to set aside an afternoon for parents to visit. At a convenient date some time later there will be a formal evening ceremony with music and address. The school is not yet ready for the formal opening so the date of the various functions was left with the principal to decide. The public will be duly notified.

WILL DEVELOP BIG MISSOURI

Pat Daly to Spend Up to Half a Million as a Starter on Mine.

FINANCING THE WORK

Prince Rupert Should Have Smelter to Handle All Custom Ore.

Taking with him, T. A. Wilson, a mining engineer from New York, and with sufficient money to carry on a great deal of development work, Pat Daly, the well known mining man, goes tomorrow to do some real work on the Big Missouri mine at Stewart. He and Mr. Wilson will inspect the mine carefully and decide on a course to be followed in connection with the operation. As the buildings are all on the ground there will be no preparatory work to be done and Mr. Daly says he expects to have a number of men working all winter at the mine.

Asked how he could expect to find a mine where Sir Donald Mann had failed, Mr. Daly said the drill had told very little. They had all the reports on the mine following the drilling and he felt certain they would yet strike it rich.

He had found the ore at the Premier and he felt sure he could do the same at the Big Missouri.

Two Companies. In regard to the financing of the mine, Mr. Daly explained that there were two companies, one a holding company incorporated in the United States, known as the "Portland Canal Mines" and another incorporated in British Columbia, known as the "Daley Mines Co., Ltd." Stock in the former had been placed on sale in New York and a good deal had been sold on Wall Street. He showed "curb reports" giving quotations of the stock selling at a premium. It was put on the market at a dollar a share and was quoted variously at from a dollar and a quarter up to two and a half dollars. Sales were also recorded in the printed reports.

Mr. Daly says that the people who have the financing of this mine in hand are shrewd businessmen who operate in a large way and they are prepared to spend a good deal of money on the mine. As a starter he has something over half a million dollars for development work.

Need of Smelter. Pat has great faith in the Portland Canal district. He says he believes there will be immense activity there in the near future and that there will be a number of good mines yet found which will keep the place busy and turn the eyes of the world in that direction.

The need of a smelter, was emphasized by Mr. Daly. He says he thinks, Prince Rupert people should organize a smelter, which might be located right here or close by so that it would serve the Skeena River districts as well as Portland Canal.
