## Injunction Against the Government POLITICAL HOUSE CLEANING GOING ON AT OTTAWA BY PREMIER

### Meighan Is Left with Only Three Members of Cabinet Drayton, Tolmie and Kemp

(Canadian National Telegraphs.)  
OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—(1:45 p.m.)—All but four members of the cabinet have handed in their resignations to give Meighan a free hand in cabinet reconstruction in view of the coming election. Those remaining in office are Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance; Dr. Simon Fraser Tolmie, minister of agriculture; Sir Edward Kemp, without portfolio, and the premier himself.

Members of the cabinet—Foster, Reid and Calder—have declined to offer for re-election but are slated for the Senate, while Doherty is booked as permanent representative at the Paris conference. Meighan is also anxious to return to the west. Guthrie and Ballantyne hold the view that the premier will advise in bringing on the elections. Material is hard to find, and the Premier is in a quandary as to the new cabinet.

### ICE SUPPLY IS RELIEVED

Out of 205,000 Pounds Offering  
at Fish Exchange This  
Morning, 133,000 Pounds  
Sold.

The ice situation on the local  
halibut market is somewhat  
relieved and the supply is easing

supply of refrigerator cars. At  
the Fish Exchange today 205,000  
pounds was offered for sale and  
all was bought with the excep-  
tion of 75,000 pounds, no bids  
having been made for the  
catches of the Holland, 50,000  
pounds, and the Democrat,  
25,000 pounds.

### EXECUTED FOR PARTICIPATING IN ALLEGED RIOT

RIGA, Sept. 9.—Sixty-  
one persons have been ex-  
ecuted by the Bolsheviks  
charged with participating  
in the recent Petrograd  
plot, according to the  
Pravda newspaper. Sixteen  
women were included  
among the victims.

### MAY NOT APPEAL THE G. T. AWARD

Expense of Carrying Case to  
Privy Council May Prevent  
Going Further.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—Although  
the press cables from Canada  
assert an appeal to the Privy  
Council will be taken against  
the judgment of the Grand  
Trunk Arbitration Board declar-  
ing the common stock and pre-  
ferred stock of the railway is  
valueless, there is reason to  
believe the stockholders will  
hesitate to make the appeal owing  
to the expense.

### VALERA WILL NOT BE AT CONFERENCE

Willing to Leave Conduct Negotia-  
tions With Cabinet Committee  
to Arthur Griffith.

DUBLIN, Sept. 9.—It is reported  
here that if envoys are appointed  
to confer with the British cabinet  
committee on the Irish situation,  
Eamonn de Valera will not be one  
of them. He will be willing to  
leave the conduct of negotiations  
with Arthur Griffith.

### Province Cannot Interfere with Employment of Orientals

VANCOUVER, Sept. 9.—Until the constitutionality of the  
Oriental order-in-council Validation Act has been passed upon by  
the Supreme Court of Canada, probably in October, the Govern-  
ment of British Columbia is restrained by an injunction granted  
by Mr. Justice Murphy from prohibiting the employment of  
Japanese or Chinese by the holders of timber licenses in the  
province. The case will ultimately be carried to the Judicial  
Committee of the British Privy Council.

### NEGATIVE POSITION OF UNITED STATES CAUSE OF MANDATES' DELAY

GENEVA, Sept. 9.—Charges that  
the "purely negative" position of  
the United States had been re-  
sponsible for the delay in appli-  
cation of the mandates by the  
League of Nations were made by  
Lord Robert Cecil at today's  
session.

### COLORED THINKING AND AGE OF EARTH TO BE DISCUSSED

EDINBURGH, Sept. 9.—The  
British Association for the  
Advancement of Science has opened  
its annual meeting which  
will be in session for a week.  
All kinds of questions will be  
discussed ranging from "Colo-  
red Thinking" to "The Age of the  
Earth" by leading British and  
foreign scientists.

Abbott's Tracey, a favorite, came  
second with Milenko the third.

### Judge Parker Urges Knowing Each Other

### Eminent United States Jurist Would Have the English Speaking Nations Stand Together

OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—A plea to Canadians to aid in promoting  
a spirit of friendship and goodwill between the people of Great  
Britain and the United States was made by Hon. Alton B. Parker  
of New York in an eloquent address delivered before the annual  
meeting of the Canadian Bar Association here.

Judge Parker, who has taken a prominent part in a number  
of movements for the furtherance of amicable relations between  
his own country and the British nations, declared the war had  
demonstrated to all men not blinded by prejudice that "it is now,  
and ever will be, wise for the  
two great English-speaking na-  
tions to stand together for the  
peace of the whole world if they  
can influence it, and if they  
cannot, then for their joint pro-  
tection.

### RAID ON GREEK SHIP RESULTS BIG DRUG HAUL

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—A police  
raid on the Greek steamer King  
Alexander, in which seven mem-  
bers of the crew were wounded by  
pistol shots, yielded drugs valued  
at \$75,000 and liquor at \$15,000.  
Frank Fitzpatrick, chief narco-  
tic officer, who participated in  
the raid, committed suicide on the  
deck for unexplained reasons.

### WINDOW SMASHING IN MARMALADE TOWN BY UNEMPLOYED MOBS

will amount to many thousands of  
pounds. Numerous arrests were  
made.

### CANADIAN SCOTTISH SAILED TODAY FOR HER MAIDEN TRIP

The Canadian Government Mer-  
chant Marine steamer Canadian  
Scottish, Captain Hocking, com-  
pleted landing here last night and  
cleared this morning at 9 o'clock  
for Portland and Vancouver, at  
which ports she will take on more  
cargo before finally leaving on her  
maiden ocean voyage for Australia  
and New Zealand.

### ENGINEER ABOARD CANADIAN IMPORTER WAS BADLY BURNED

ASTORIA, Sept. 9.—Meagre re-  
ports picked up by the naval radio  
station say an accident occurred  
this morning aboard the disabled  
steamer Canadian Importer, which  
is being towed to Victoria. An  
engineer on the craft is said to  
have been badly burned.

### Political Situation at Ottawa Shows Cabinet Is Being Rapidly Organized

OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—Cabinet reconstruction is proceeding  
pace, but no announcement to the public has been made so far.  
The name of C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries,  
is mentioned as one who has definitely decided to retire.

OTTAWA, Sept. 9 (noon).—It is expected that within a  
week cabinet reorganization will have been completed and the  
election campaign will be in full swing. So far as the Government  
is concerned, cabinet reorganization and a manifesto from the  
Premier, accompanied by an announcement of the date of  
election, will mark the opening of  
the campaign proper.

### CAPT. JANNEY IN HOSPITAL

Forcible Feeding Will Be Em-  
ployed Result of Hunger  
Strike.

LETHBRIDGE, Sept. 9.—Capt.  
E. L. Janney, who is in jail here  
charged with selling stock in an  
airplane company unincorporated in  
Alberta, is very weak on the  
thirty-third day of his hunger  
strike. The jail physicians or-  
dered him removed to the hos-  
pital where forcible feeding will  
be employed.

### SEVERAL CASES ON DOCKET FOR ASSIZES

Five Civil, Two Divorces and  
Two Criminal Cases so Far  
Set Down.

The Fall Assizes of the Su-  
preme Court will be held here  
next month commencing on a  
date which has not yet been an-  
nounced. There will be quite  
a number of cases for hearing,  
the most of those so far slated  
being civil cases. There will be  
two criminal cases and two di-  
vorce suits.

### FALL SESSION END OCTOBER

John Oliver Denies that Domi-  
nion Election Will Affect Pro-  
vincial Plans.

VICTORIA, Sept. 9.—Premier  
Oliver denies the rumor that the  
Provincial Government has de-  
cided to call off the fall session  
of the Legislature and not meet  
until after the new year, as the  
result of the Dominion election.  
"Nothing in it," he said. "The  
fall session will be held about  
the end of October."

### NATIONAL DEBT HAS DECLINED

OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—Canada's  
national debt has declined by  
nearly \$13,000,000 during the  
month of August. The net debt  
now stands at \$2,314,949,085.

### DOHERTY TO MAKE PROTEST

Would Like to Eliminate Article  
Ten From League of  
Nations.

GENEVA, Sept. 9.—Hon. Chas.  
Doherty, delegate from Canada to  
the League of Nations, announces  
he will demand from the assembly  
floor the elimination of Article 10  
from the covenant.
