CONVENTION AT PORT ARTHUR

James M. Campbell the Local Delegate, Tells About Proceedings.

Amalgamation of returned soldier bodies in Canada was the most important business taken up at the Dominion convention at Port Arthur from which J. M. Campbell, the local delegate returned yesterday.

On the opening day there were several prominent persons in attendance, among these being Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion, of Fort William, minister of Soldiers' civil re-establishment in the new Dominion cabinet.

The first business was the election of officers and the stalling of committees. J. M. Campbell, the local delegate, was appointed to the procedure committee and was also made the whip for B. C. delegates.

B. C. Gets Point.

At the caucus of B. C. delegates the line of action for amalgamation was taken up. The western men were all strong for this and they framed a resolution which they presented to the convention on Tuesday asking that amalgamation be the first order of business.

Matters of re-establishment were taken, the most important business being the passing of a resolution asking the government to increase widows' pensions to \$75 per month.

Invited to Paris. In the course of the convention days, the city of Port Arthur entertained the delegates at a banquet in the Prince Arthur Hotel.

There were various other social and entertainment functions for the visitors which included a drive around the twin cities and entertainments and dances in the Port Arthur Armory and the Fort William club rooms.

COLONIZATION OF B. C. LANDS

Two Million Acres Government Owned Along Canadian National, Pattullo Announces

VICTORIA, Oct. 27.—Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, speaking in the Legislature, announced that the government was about to inaugurate a comprehensive colonization policy, looking to the settlement of selected settlers upon the vacant lands of British Columbia.

The government controls some 2,000,000 acres of the finest lands along the Canadian National lines, lands which reverted to the crown under the proportionate allotment legislation of 1916.

Mr. Whitlock, in speaking of his company and its plans, said it was early yet to talk of his company's ships invading the Pacific. There were rumors from time to time of their doing so, but nothing so far had materialized.
