extravagant lines but the Government refused to let the people know about the business. It was absolutely necessary that the finances be restored to a sound basis.

"I trust that the result of the election will be the return of those who will build up the G. T. P. Railway and the city of Prince Rupert. No one who desires the welfare of this place and the railway will hesitate in coming to the conclusion that there should be a change and that friends of the city and railway should be restored to power at Ottawa.

Fred Stork.

Fred Stork, the Liberal candidate, spoke briefly, explaining that as far as the Liberals were concerned this meeting was the opening gun. He dealt with local issues, stating that there was but

one method of relief and that was by a change of government. Unless there was a change of government the city would likely amount to nothing more than it was today. From one ocean to the other there was evidence that there was going to be a change, and old members of the government such as R. F. Green, Dr. Reid, J. A. Calder and George Foster were taking shelter. W. L. Mackenzie King, who would be the next Premier, was thoroughly posted on the north and its needs.

"We can place ourselves in support of the government and be assured of sympathetic treatment and development. About a fortnight ago I left Prince Rupert and was then the only candidate in the field. Since then Colonel Peck

has entered. As a soldier and a citizen I pay wholehearted tribute to his ability. I want no mud-slinging and there will be none from me."

SETS COLONEL RIGHT.

Mr. Stork then went on to read from Hansard in regard to a statement that had been made by Colonel Peck in regard to the establishment of returned men in the fisheries. It was true that he had moved a bill to this effect and it had been seconded by Mr. Turgeon and supported by Mr. Duff and Dr. Chisholm. He neglected to say that the Prime Minister had not wanted it and that the Colonel had withdrawn it in compliance with Sir Robert Borden's wishes.

Mr. Stork said he would not commit himself to achieving much as far as the Oriental question was concerned, but he was persuaded that they were surely gaining control in the best province of the Dominion. He was absolutely and unalterably opposed to another single one entering the Dominion and he would use his voice and vote towards preventing it. He would stand ready at all times to close the door of B. C. and the Dominion to them.

He was glad that Mr. Meighen had stood godfather to the Closure Bill which had prevented free speech in the House of Commons. He had also been the mechanic who had framed the Wartime Election Act which had insulted immigrants when British equality and justice had been promised them.

"We expect from what we hear and see to have a new government on December 7 with W. L. Mackenzie King as Premier and myself, I hope, as representative here, assisting and supporting his government."

W. E. Williams was chairman of the meeting. He gave credit to Colonel Peck for his attainments at Ottawa in the past, but felt that the Liberal government was the thing for Canada now and for Prince Rupert especially.


