

Should Encourage

Shipping to Come. The announcement made by J. W. Nicholls, controller at the cold storage plant, that a shipping firm might come here regularly if it could secure 500 tons of freight each trip, is a most interesting one and it is to be hoped the Trade and Commerce Committee of the Board of Trade will lose no time in taking up the matter with them. With the new dock almost finished and with the development of the business of the district, it would seem to be an easy matter to secure that much cargo. It might pay the city to put a good man on the job at once to arrange with fish packers, canners and others to make shipments by that route.

It might seem at first sight as if a shipping concern coming here would take much business away from the railroad. It must be remembered, however, that for the long haul much freight is being sent to Vancouver and transferred there, to the great disadvantage of local shippers and with damage to the goods. If the ships once commenced coming here they would be an encouragement to local business and some of them might carry shipments of lumber and thus help keep our mills going. With the starting of the pulp mill, another industry would provide freight for vessels for the east coast or the United Kingdom.

Let People Develop Country.

There is at Burns Lake a group of men who are anxious to drill for oil. They wish to spend their own money in putting down holes to test the country. They are finding it difficult to secure licenses, after having complied with all the necessary forms. It seems difficult to understand what the objection could

The people of Burns Lake are very much disturbed over the refusal to grant the licenses. It does seem queer that the possible industries of the country should be tied up when people are willing to take a chance by spending their money in development. There may be some good reason for refusing, but if there is, the people should be told As it is they are feeling very sore with the provincial government. We want to develop all the coal and oil and other natural products that are in sight and the Government we fancy should be very diffident about taking any action which would retard such development.

frish Settlement Seems Possible.

The people of the country are undoubtedly looking for great things from the coming conference between the Irish leaders and the British Government. Undoubtedly the Sinn Fein Irishmen's feel very strongly or they would not take the chances they run every day of being shot or imprisoned. On the other hand the feeling is just as strong on the other side.

There was little hope of a settlement as long as the leaders refused to get together and talk things over. Now that they have agreed to this there is every hope of a settlement.. People in this country all hope that strife in that country will cease and that from this time on Ireland will return to industrial pursuits as an outlet for their surplus gnergy.
