MASTADONS ARE NOT TROPICAL

Scientist Visiting Yukon Tells of Some of Remains Found There.

DAWSON, Sept. 13.—Some of the popular notions in regard to the extinct animals of the north were shattered here by a distinguished visitor, G. S. Miller, curator of mammals at the United States National Museum. He saw here the remains of mammoths, two or three kinds of bison, a large bear, a deer and a horse. All of these animals, he stated, although related to others now living, long have been extinct, probably since the early part of the ice age.

A popular misconception, says Mr. Miller, exists regarding these animals. The presence of these animals does not indicate a tropical climate here at one time. Animals essentially the same as the mammoths which are found here, he explains, have been found in Siberia frozen in the ice in such good condition that their stomach contents can be studied. These show, says Mr.

Miller, that the animals were feeding on twigs and herbs essentially like those which grow today in Siberia, a region whose climate is not very different from that of the Yukon valley.

Mammoth's Teeth.

The large teeth frequently found in this region and popularly called mastodon teeth, explains Mr. Miller, are mostly teeth of the mammoth. The crown of the mastodon's tooth has large tubercles or rounded bumps like those of the back teeth of a pig, while the teeth ordinarily found here are flat-crowned, with cross ridges of hard enamel for grinding. Teeth of this kind are found only in the mammoth and the living elephants of India and Africa.

Mr. Miller calls attention to the fact that museums would be

much interested to receive the smaller bones to which little attention is usually paid, and which easily could be picked up and saved. It is to be hoped, he says, that miners and others will take an interest in seeing that they reach the museums. He secured some specimens when here, and will be pleased to examine any others which might be brought to his attention when he returns here, possibly ten days or two weeks hence. Mr. and Mrs. Miller will visit Fairbanks before returning.

CANTEEN FUNDS OF SOLDIERS

Premier Meighen Has to Answer for Disposal of the Money.

HAMILTON, Sept. 13.—As if Premier Meighen did not have enough to worry him in the oncoming election which he has brought on, several hundred members of the Discharged Soldiers' and Sailors' Federation here have sent a pointedly worded communication to the Prime Minister, in which they demand to know by what right he and his cabinet have sought to make good fellows out of themselves by laying their hands on the \$1,000,000 Field Force Canteen Fund and giving the G. W. V. A. \$20,000 of it, with the promise that \$10,000 more would follow each month.

Calls Action Illegal.

Through their president, Sergt.-Major Jack Anderson, M.C., members of the federation contend in the communication that such action on the part of the government is wholly illegal inasmuch as the fund is the property of returned soldiers and not to be touched without a mandate from themselves.

Mr. Anderson reminds Premier Meighen of the promise made by Major Hume Cronyn on May 31 last to the effect that the canteen fund would remain untouched unless the men consented that it should be used for any specific purpose. Concluding, Mr. Anderson's communication says in part:

"I question your jurisdiction, sir, in disposing of any of the money of this fund. I am unaware of any law that permits you or your government to utilize in any form whatsoever the fund trusted to your care without first receiving a mandate from the legal owners.

Entitled to Voice.

"It is true that you are our Prime Minister and leader, and we respect your leadership, but it was never intended that you should usurp the divine right of Prussian kings and assume without request direct control of individual rights and liberties; for, from time immemorial, canteen funds have been available to the creators of them, and they have invariably been entitled to a voice in their disposition."

The communication demands that the G. W. V. A. return all money thus advanced to it from the fund, plus interest at 6 1/2 per cent., otherwise members of the local Soldiers' and Sailors' Federation forcefully remind the premier that they will apply to the courts of justice for redress.
