Steamer Catala To Be Off Run For Some Time

The popular coastal liner Catala of the Union Steamship Co. fleet, which will be withdrawn from service in Vancouver at the conclusion of her present voyage, will, it is understood, be off the run for at least four months as it has been necessary to send to England for a new boiler to be installed in her. The steamer Cardena will take the Catala's run on the Vancouver-Prince Rupert-Anyox-Stewart route while the steamer Venture will replace the Cardena on the Vancouver-Bella Coola-Skeena River-Prince Rupert run:

Running slow on account of her leaky boiler, the Catala called here from 12 to 1:30 noon today southbound from Anyox and Stewart to Vancouver, being two days behind schedule. She called at Mill Bay in the Naas River to load a large consignment of canned salmon.
