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GERMANY MUST PAY OR SUFFER CONSEQUENCES UNITED STATES ADOPTS FRENCH MILITARY SYSTEM FOR INCREASED ARMY

Allies Putting Thumb Screws on Germany to Enforce Their Demands being Complied with

VICTORIA, April 22.—In addition to the troops now on the front, an extra 100,000 men are provided to enforce the allied demands if they are not met by Germany by May 1. Among the penalties provided by the allies are that Germany continue to work the Ruhr mines under Allied control and production is to be heavily taxed. German Imperial Bank holdings must be transferred to the Allies of Coblenz and Cologne branches as security, or it will be by the Allied Commission. Germany has withdrawn her shipping estimate, admitting it and promises to submit a lower valuation.

UNITED STATES DECLINES TO BE MEDIATOR

Must Submit Proper
Proposals Before Action
Is Taken.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The United States Government declines to mediate between Germany and the Allies in regard to reparations question. Berlin refused last night. Washington, however, considers the allies to renew negotiations if Germany submits proposals as would present basis for discussion. Communication was in answer to a German note received asking President Harding to umpire the reparations matter.

PUT CHILD GETS NO MONEY

Decided That Illegitimate
Fighting Not Provided for
in Field Will.

CAR SHORTAGE AGAIN ACUTE

Every Day Fish is Being Taken
From Prince Rupert to
Foreign Ports.

There were five carloads of halibut offered for sale by the various boats at the Fish Exchange this morning but there were only three refrigerators available so only three carloads of halibut was bought for eastern shipment. The car shortage is becoming acute again and day after day boats are leaving port or selling at short prices for cold storage.

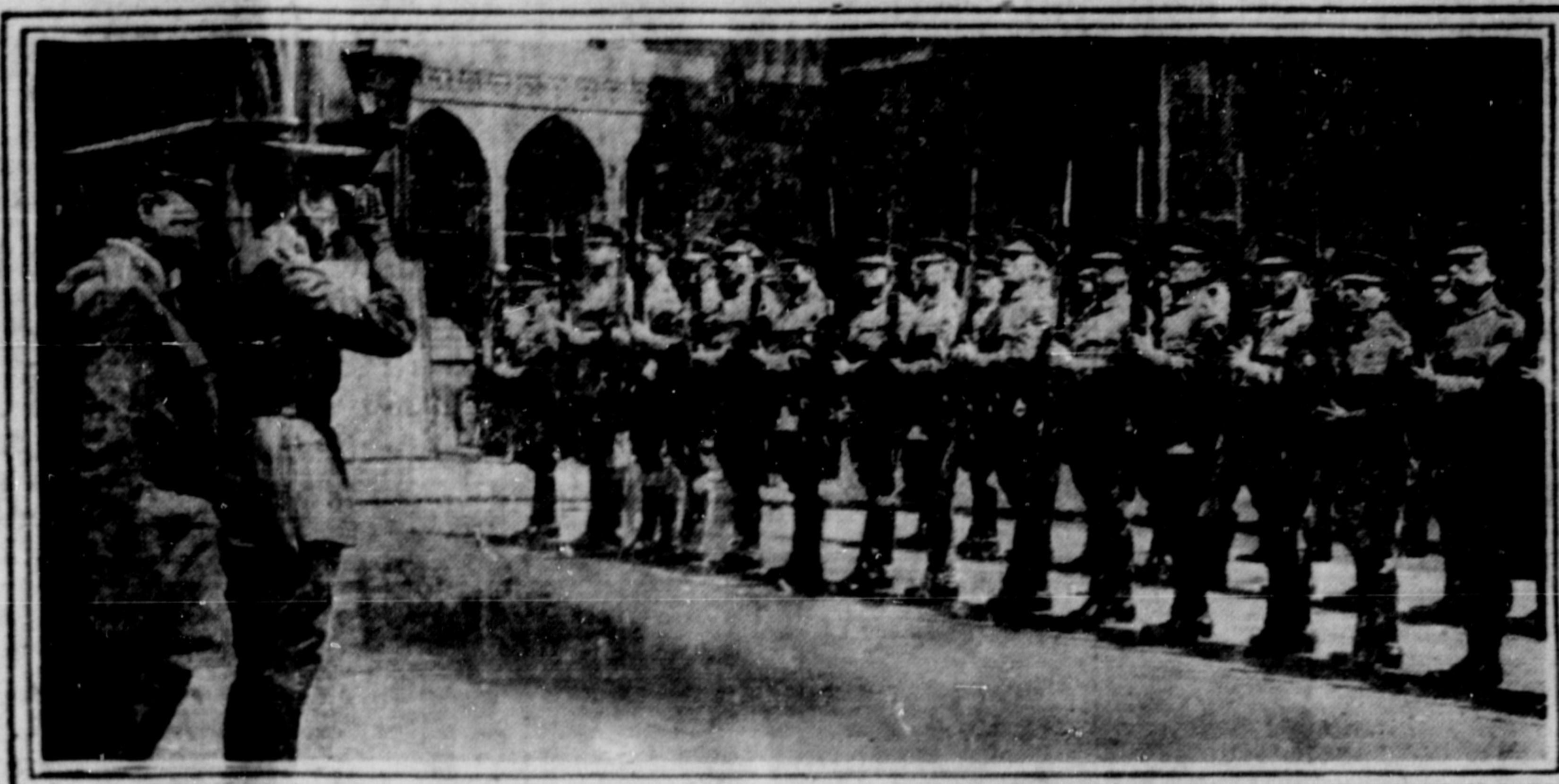
The residence of Bishop Fogarty of Killaloe was set on fire by two incendiaries who were arrested.

King George of England has called the army reserves and volunteers to active service in the threatened industrial revolution. The King's action was caused by the refusal of the striking coal miners to renew negotiations with mine owners and the decision of the "Triple Alliance" to strike on Tuesday unless the miner's terms for a conference are met.

Actual Construction of Aerial Tram Line from Premier Has Commenced

STEWART, April 22.—Work has started on the actual construction of the new aerial tramline connecting the Premier mine with tidewater between Stewart and Hyder. B. Graham, representative of the Riblets Company, is in charge of the work which will take at least six months to complete and will employ about two hundred men.

There will be approximately fifteen anchor stations and 150 towers, requiring about a million feet of timber.

The capacity of the tram when completed will be ten tons per hour carried in thousand pound buckets.

The power to operate the tram will be generated by a fifty horse power electric motor.

This line will be the second longest aerial tram on the continent, the longest being in Wyoming. That one is sixteen and a half miles in length.

Mr. Graham has taken an office in Hyder where he will make his headquarters.

B.C. LUMBER FOR EGYPT

Major Fisher Trying to Arrange
for Permanent Market in That
Country

VICTORIA, April 22.—Efforts to build up a permanent market for British Columbia lumber in Egypt and neighboring countries are to be made by Major R. E. Fisher, who recently visited the Province in connection with an order for eight million feet of ties for an Egyptian railway.

STEAMSHOVEL TRACTOR FOR ROAD WORK

New Machine is on Way for Use
in Opening up Interior
Country.

In about three weeks a new tractor steamshovel of the caterpillar type is expected to arrive for use in the interior, more particularly in the Francois Lake country for use on the heavier road construction for the Provincial Government. The shovel is similar to those used on railways but instead of being mounted on a car is on a caterpillar tractor.

The new machine is expected to revolutionize road work, and if it proves quite successful, others will be provided for other parts of the new country that has to be opened up.

One of the great problems of opening up and settling a new country is making roads. Some useful work has been done by the government under the public works department, the headquarters of which is in this city. The demand is still great, however, and the new machine should be a useful factor in helping to speed up the work.

SOUTH IRELAND ASKS ELECTIONS POSTPONED

LONDON, April 22.—The cabinet is considering the request from Ireland for the postponement of the elections to the southern parliament. No decision has yet been reached.

CHRISTENING OF SHIP

Definite preparations are being made for the first Prince Rupert built steamer, the Canadian Scot-tish, to slide into the water at 5:15 new time on the afternoon of Thursday, May 12, after she has been christened by Mrs. C. W. Peck, wife of the member for Skeena constituency in the Dominion Parliament. There will be the usual launching ceremonies and it is possible that a half holiday may be arranged for the whole city that afternoon.

For the same evening arrangements have been made by J. F. Maguire on behalf of the Navy League for Miss Mary Izard and Mrs. Dalby Morkill to give a concert here in the Westholme Theatre, and this will be followed by a grand invitation ball under the auspices of the Navy League in the St. Andrew's hall.

Miss Izard has already been heard here and made such a good impression that there is no doubt but she will have a good reception on this occasion. Mrs. Morkill too is well known to Prince Rupert audiences and will be welcomed.

The boys of the Naval Brigade will take a prominent part in the proceedings of the launching day both at the actual ceremony and at the entertainments in the evening.

CARVELL IS ON DEFENCE

Speaking at Saskatoon Replies to
Criticism of Senator
Robertson.

SASKATOON, April 22.—Hon. Frank B. Carvell, chairman of the Railway Commission of Canada, declared at a public dinner here that Senator Robertson's figures, on which he bases his criticism of the commission, do not take into consideration the conditions when piled up over time and make gross wages unreasonable.

He blamed the big railway unions for manipulating the working conditions until they have the railroads in their grip and are largely responsible for the railway problems of today.

Mr. Carvell again urged economy in the services and reduction in the wage scales.
