Modern Methods Have Limitations.

Modern methods and conceptions have their limitations. Last night Archbishop Du Vernet spoke of the modern conceptions and the result of psychological study in the religious life.

Archbishop Du Vernet is a man who believes in adapting himself to modern ideas and modern methods. He believes in using the press to promulgate his views. Through the Daily News he often addresses the largest audience he can possibly get in Prince Rupert and its environs.

Archbishop's Views Are News.

The Archbishop is able to secure entry into the press because he has a real message for the people. His views are news. He has a keen intellect and is able to analyze and define and condense. The result is that when he writes he has something to say and newspapers are always glad to pass on a real message.

Must Hold Fast to Old Fundamentals.

In spite of this new method of propaganda, the old must not be forgotten. The power of a good public speaker is as great as it ever was. It is greater, in that the eloquent speech can be passed on by means of a newspaper report.

There is too great a tendency these days to forget the value of learning to debate. There is a desire to get our education through the movies instead of by contact with the master minds of the world in literature and with the modern masters through debate and personal discussion.

Debaters Play Part In Government.

Why are there so many lawyers in Parliament? Because they are debaters. Part of their legal training is public speaking. The result is that at election times, when public speakers are needed, they are invited to the fore and they go.

Public speaking is an art that can easily be abused. It can be used with effect in a bad cause as well as a good one. That is why it is necessary that young men with high ideals should be trained to express themselves, for only so can the right be advocated or defended and the bad denounced.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

MUCH HOSPITAL WORK BY LADIES

Creditable Report of Activities for 1920 Presented at Hospital Board Meeting

Twelve regular meetings of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the general hospital were held during the year 1920 and the mending at the hospital has been taken care of and many contributions have been made as well. The following articles were contributed: 10 dozen bath towels, 100 large sheets, 100 draw sheets, 125 pillow cases, 51 bedspreads, 18 hospital shirts, 20 binders, 1 oil stove, 24 1lb. sheets, 24 1lb. stockings, 24 lap sheets, 24 stand covers, 24 instrument tray covers, 50 line towels, 24 doctors' caps and 24 doctors' gowns.

A donation of \$25 was also sent to the hospital board to assist in buying Christmas presents for the nurses and patients and a piano has been bought for the use of the nurses.

A dance was held in October, as well as two sales of home cooking, and a vaudeville show from which the Prince Rupert Dramatic Society handed in \$155.45. A booth was also conducted at the exhibition. The receipts together with the dues paid make the total amount raised for the year \$2,181.42.

This very creditable report was presented at the annual meeting of the hospital board on Tuesday night by Mrs. Blance, secretary of the Ladies' Auxiliary. Mrs. Darton is president of the Auxiliary.

MAYO TO SHIP 3,000 TONS ORE

Will be Rich and Permanent Camps, says Juneau Customs Collector

JUNEAU, Feb. 3.—Last year's business at Skagway showed an improvement over the business of the year before and hope prevails there that the depression resulting from the war and the high cost of living and producing has ended, according to the annual report of F. J. Vandewall, the Deputy Collector of Customs in charge at that place, which has been received at Customs headquarters in Juneau. It is believed that lower prices for commodities and the lowering wages in the interior will result in the opening of new mineral sections that are supplied through Skagway.

Mr. Vandewall predicts that the Mayo silver-lead district on the Stewart River will be a rich and permanent camp. The Yukon Gold Company is proceeding with development work there on an extensive scale and will have 3,000 tons of sacked ore hauled out to the river for shipment to the Outside, via St. Michael, during the period of river navigation next summer.
