Kerkin Academy. Editor Daily News: In regard to a name for the new school, I suggest the following: "The Kerkin Academy" or school in honor of Dr. W. T. Kerkin who has held the position as chairman of the School Board so long, and devoted his time without remuneration. A. C.

William Booth. Editor Daily News: While holding in deep respect the opinions of those who have forwarded names as suitable for our new Public School, I am strongly inclined to favor the name of "William Booth" as the most suitable, and, this I do for the following reasons.

His war record is one that teachers can make use of to instill the deepest patriotism among the children of the schools. He was splendid in the simplicity of his life, splendid in his heroic devotion to duty, splendid in the simple friendships of life, and splendid in his death. He walked among us as one of ourselves with no pretensions to court favor or applause, yet embodying a strength of soul, and a simplicity of devotion, that stamps him for all time as a hero soul. Powerful Lesson.

Secondly, in selecting the name of "William Booth" we inculcate a powerful lesson to the humblest child in the school, viz. that it is not wealth, high lineage or social distinction that will merit the reward, but "duty well and nobly performed" in whatever sphere of life he may be placed.

Finally, what more powerful weapon can be placed in the hands of teachers to warn the school children of the constant dangers lurking in our public streets from passing traffic, than to point to the name of "William Booth" who lost his life that the children of Prince Rupert might live. Lesson to Public.

Not only to teachers and children would the name be a constant reminder to avoid unnecessary danger, but also to the public at large, it would tell the perpetual lesson that "false kindness" to children is often fraught with great disaster. JAMES C. BRADY, Principal High School.

The application from J. G. Moody asking that he be allowed to use space under the sidewalk in connection with the proposed repairs to the Empress Theatre Building was last night granted by the council on the recommendation of the Board of Works.

Joe Brown's car met with an accident at the corner of Seventh Street and Third Avenue this morning when the driver struck the curb making a sharp turn. The car was damaged but neither the driver or the two fishermen passengers were injured seriously.

At last night's meeting of the city council, Ald. Frizzell drew attention to the bad condition of Park Avenue road leading to the cemetery. As a recent funeral a car had gone through the street and the stringers and supports had been found to be rotten. The Board of Works will take the matter up.

The resolution of the Economic Council of Victoria regarding plans for unemployment relief this winter to pensioners and ex-vocational students was endorsed by the city council last night. There was a letter from the local Great War Veterans' Association recommending that the council take this action.

Chief A. C. Minty and Constable Alex Saint, of the provincial police, returned yesterday from Inverness where they investigated the circumstances surrounding the stabbing of E. Ekara on Saturday night. They were unsuccessful in arresting Y. Toura who is charged with the wounding. He left the place within an hour of the occurrence, it is stated.

At the council meeting last night Ald. Silversides and Ald. Kelly gave notice of motion for the purchase of an ambulance by the city. In the meantime the matter will be taken up with the Hospital Board by the Utilities Committee with a view to cost, design and operation of an ambulance. The aldermen expressed unanimous feeling that an ambulance was badly needed here.
