Bank Reports Very Hopeful.

Bank reports are becoming very hopeful. Usually the banks ? foresee any coming depression and warn their customers of it. They also foresee a trade revival and, while not so keen in telling about it for fear of rousing false expectations and encouraging speculation, the reports they issue are optimistic in tone.

We have now reached the period when the banks are issning more or less optimistic reports, but with caution. The Royal Bank has just sent out to its customers a report in which it shows that it was necessary there should be a dull period following the war and that, with a fairly good harvest and with adjustments of the currency, conditions should very much improve.

Owing to the fact that merchants have generally rather small stocks on hand, manufacturers look for a slight improvement of business during the autumn. Following the wise method of building up reserves, most of the old established Canadian companies have been able to withstand the shock of falling prices, and failures have not been as numerous as was expected for such time. In the first six months of this year there were slightly over a thousand failures in business. While that was twice as many as during the corresponding period a year ago, it is not unduly high for a period of falling prices.

Pessimistic View Is Not Justified.

"There is no standpoint from which a pessimistic view of the sort should be drawn from these columns," says the Royal Bank report.
