Sportsmen Losing Their Privileges.

Sportsmen are losing many of their hereditary privileges in the Old Country. It is now contrary to law to use pigeons for shooting matches, and coursing hares and rabbits is very much restricted. Other human restrictions are being imposed. It is illegal to use plumage of birds for trimming hats, the osprey being particularly banned. It is curious that at a time when human life is so cheap in Ireland, and following a time when men were killed like ants, Parliament should turn to the protection of animals and birds.

Liberal Choice At Convention.

Fred Stork, who was chosen Tuesday night by the Liberal Convention as the candidate to contest this constituency for them in the next election, whenever it may take place, is so well known to Prince Rupert people that it is almost superfluous to comment on the choice. He is a local business man and is thoroughly familiar with the district. If elected, as he probably will be, he cannot fail to prove a good representative.

It is likely to be some time before there is an election, but Fred is there, ready at any time to take the field when the clarion call goes forth and the political battle is staged.

New German Spirit.

Says Sir Philip Gibbs.

Sir Philip Gibbs, well-known war correspondent and fiction writer, issues a note of warning against the industrial danger to the world from Germany. According to that authority there is a change come over the country. Let Sir Philip speak in his own picturesque way:

"There is a new spirit in Germany. It is economic enthusiasm, with peace and labor as its conditions. They will show the world what German genius can do in industry."

"One thing perplexes me. It is certain that Germany can pay her indemnities only by enormously increased exports, but if they are increased to that extent won't they ruin the commerce of other nations? It is a devilish dilemma, for which as yet I can see no solution."

"I see another strange thing. I see a people braced and energized by defeat, whereas the victor nations like England have slackened into listlessness."

"Imperial pomp and pageantry have passed from Berlin. No guards surround its palaces. Only a few security police in neat green uniforms remain as a memory of all those military types who used to pass with such arrogance about the city."

Colossal Example of Industrial Energy.

"The German people are prepared to give the world the most colossal example of industrial energy ever seen. I think they will and I am not at all sure that the world will like it. In order to pay the indemnities they will have to increase their exports at least five times."

"With the low mark and low wages their goods will invade all the world's markets. When they can make safety razors of excellent quality for 18 cents, as they are doing, no tariff will keep them out. It is merely folly to believe that the German wealth is sufficiently great now to meet her obligations. She must create this wealth."

"Everywhere I find among German people, high or low, a firm resolve to pay what they have promised if it is humanly possible. All but the junkers, who are suiting in their castles, have abandoned the militaristic philosophy. Among the working classes it has disappeared, at least for the present generation, unless France goads them too savagely. And I notice that German children never play soldier games as they used to."

ENGINEERS OF PULP COMPANY VISITED ECSTALL TRIBUTARY

After a three days' trip on the launch Seal Cove in their quest for power projects in the vicinity of Prince Rupert, E. F. Duby, local manager; H. P. Crowell, resident engineer, and J. P. Leeland, superintendent of construction, all of the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co., returned at midnight on Monday night from Brown's River, a tributary from the western side of the Ecstall River.

From their physical examination of this river, the officials are impressed that it has possibilities of becoming a good power producer. There would be 9,000 continuous horsepower available. They were indeed well pleased with the outlook for the development of this stream along these lines.

INCREASE IN CRIME SENDS UP RATE OF BURGLARY INSURANCE

MONTREAL, P.Q.—July 14.—Mainly due to the great increase in crime on the island of Montreal and inadequate police protection, the burglary insurance companies have advanced their rates radically for this island.

Class A insurance, covering jewellery, personal effects, clothing, and liquors has been advanced one hundred per cent, it was stated this morning at the office of the Employers Liability Assurance Corporation, Ltd., and specific insurance has been increased from \$5 per \$1,000 to \$7.50 per \$1,000. By specific insurance is meant the insurance of any one article or set of articles separately from any other part of the household, the value of that specific article being separately declared, and the premium calculated at so much per cent. of the declared value.
