## Water Supply For Pulp Company

### REID MCLENNAN OF RUPERT WINS GOVERNOR GENERAL'S MEDAL

#### City Council Submits By-law to Ratepayers for Agreement with Proposed Paper Concern

The City Council last night conferred in committee with E. Doby, local manager for the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Company, and an agreement was reached on terms for the supplying of water to the company. This agreement will be taken up by the city officials and will be presented in the course of a few months to the ratepayers for their adoption or rejection. It will come up at the same time as the three school by-laws which will be put through their first stages at the meeting last night.

The path of the agreement which the council will submit for approval of the ratepayers is that the company be allowed to take water over and above the requirements of the city, this supply to be used for the purpose of manufacturing paper. In return the company will be required to install water pump and water valves and to keep the water reserve full to overflowing. A provision is made for the safe-guarding of the city even with the by-law that may occur. If the company fails to keep the reserve full the city reserves the right to cancel the contract with the company. The by-law will be forwarded to the ratepayers for approval before being submitted to the city council.

#### REID MCLENNAN IS WINNER GOVERNOR'S MEDAL IN DISTRICT

VICTORIA, July 26.—Reid L. McLennan, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McLennan, Prince Rupert, is the winner of the Governor-General's medal in District No. 10, Northern British Columbia, according to the results of the entrance examinations announced by the department of education this morning. His total marks were 794 out of a possible 1100. There were three candidates writing for the honor from the Borden Street School.

#### BEER APPEAL NEXT FRIDAY

Various Matters Affecting Sale of Beverage Under Revision—Prices Changed.

VICTORIA, July 26.—The whole matter of beer selling by ex-service organizations will be taken up by the supreme court at Vancouver on Friday next, it was intimated by counsel for the Army and Navy Veterans, when the charge against the latter came up in the police court yesterday.

New prices for beer sold by the Liquor Control Board has been put through and are to become effective August 1. They affect outlying districts chiefly.

It is not unlawful for a man buying from the Government in a large bottle to put some into smaller containers for the sake of convenience. If he should wish to take a little refreshment on an outing or use it for other purposes. That is the decision of Magistrate George Jay in the police court here. He dismissed the case against Joe Ling. The decision is of great interest to those who wondered what status a man had under the act with a mickey on him.

#### FIRE AT TRAIL DAMAGE \$30,000

TRAIL, July 26.—The Star theatre, three stories and a restaurant were destroyed by fire including the mounted police headquarters. Stock was saved from the buildings and as a result the loss will not exceed \$10,000 all of which is covered by insurance.

#### SOLD BEER AGAINST LAW

Two Members of Overseas Mechanics' Club Convicted at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, July 26.—Archibald Campbell and David Kirkwood, officials of the Overseas Mechanics' Club, were yesterday found guilty before Magistrate South of selling liquor contrary to the Act. Sentence will be pronounced on Wednesday. This is the first of a number of charges against city clubs for selling beer.

#### IRISH POLICE CIVIL BASIS

Executive Preparing to Make Change, Disbanding Auxiliaries.

BELFAST, July 26.—The Irish executive is considering reorganization of the Irish police, disbanding of the auxiliaries and the moving of the Royal Irish Constabulary and the Dublin Metropolitan force to a strictly civil basis.

#### Turkish Nationalists Are Re-creating Before Strong Advance of Greek Forces

ATHENS, July 26.—The tide has turned strongly in favor of the Greeks against the Turkish Nationalists in the Asia Minor hostilities. The Hellenic forces are on the advance and the Turks in the past day have suffered heavy reverses.

An official Greek agency says in an announcement that the Turkish losses in killed and wounded, prisoners and those missing now amounts to seventy-five per cent. of their entire fighting strength in the Asia Minor war area.

LONDON, July 26.—Owing to the successful Greek advances of the past few days, the Turkish Nationalist government in Asia Minor has been obliged to transfer the seat of government and the Turkish Nationalist Assembly to Sivas.

#### Big Sockeye Run May Yet Come Says Inspector J. T. C. Williams

That the sockeye fishing will yet improve and the season not be as poor as one as anticipated is the expressed view of Inspector Williams, who has just arrived from the Skeena River canneries and is proceeding to visit other parts of the district. He says that the eggs of the fish taken so far this year are very poorly developed, being scarcely any larger than number six shot, whereas they should be almost as large as peas. This seems to indicate that the fish are not mature and the real run is yet to come.

Another good reason for thinking that the run is to come is that the hatcheries are located.

#### CANADA TO BE HEARD

Sir George Foster, acting premier, stated this morning that "the voices of the colonies would be heard" through representatives selected by the mother country if not directly.

At the Elks' Flag Day, Wednesday of next week, there are to be two competitions put on as extras, which it is expected will prove great attractions.

Gold, silver and bronze medals will be given to the girl under 15 years of age who dances the best step dance, highland fling, sword dance, Irish reel, Welsh dance or any other step dance. For this event Jim Sturgeon, a professional bagpipe player who will not be entered in the competition will play.

In order that all may be able to see the dancers and the players in the competition, a platform 20 feet square is to be erected on the grounds in such a position that everyone may see plainly.
