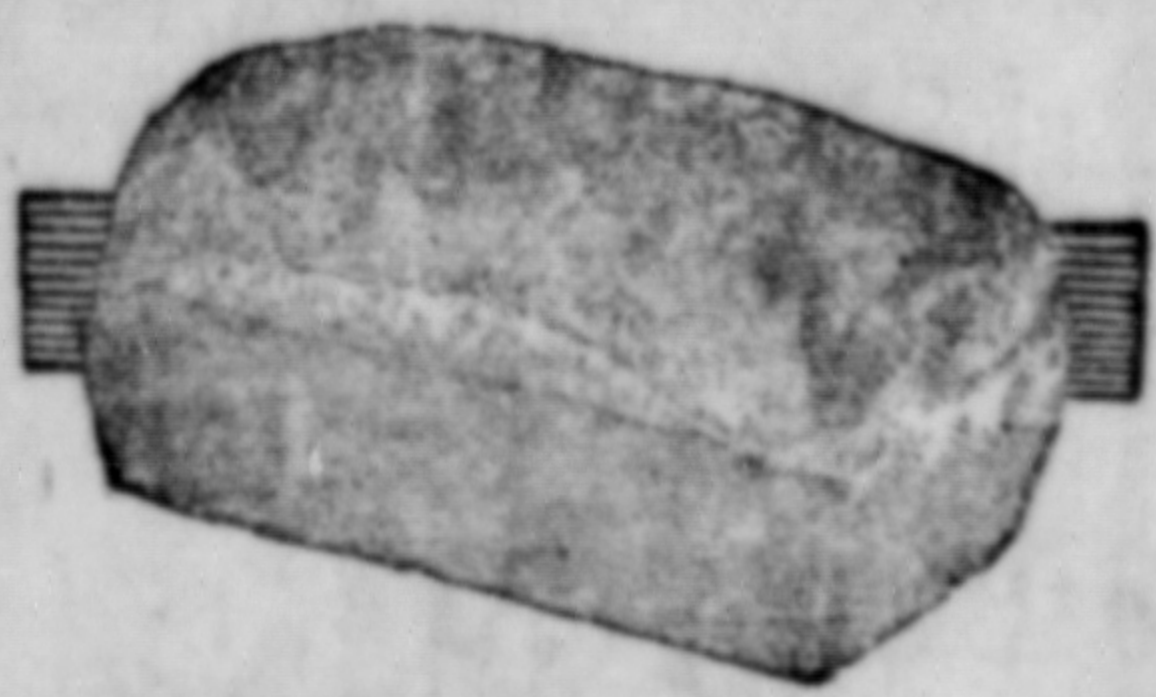

### COMPLEXION PARLIAMENT

Gradual Elimination of Unionist Majority by Defection and Election.

DURING DYING DAYS MARGIN WAS SMALL

OTTAWA, Oct. 3.—The political complexion of the House of Commons changes with each general election, generally speaking, but often there are great changes in the party standings between the time the first session of a new Parliament opens and the end of the session which precedes dissolution. This has been the case particularly in regard to the 13th Parliament, the first session of which opened on March 18, 1918 and the last session of which closed on June 4 this year. The formation of Union Government in 1917 brought together men of all shades of former political opinions, who sunk their party feelings in the effort to bring about the best possible prosecution of the war. In subsequent sessions, however, there were many "breaks" from the government benches, and the government majority in the House diminished as first the "Cross-Benchers" and then the National Progressives broke away to form their own groups to the left of the Speaker, while other members who had been elected as supporters of Union Government left the Government benches to return to seats among the Liberals. In previous sessions this movement across the floor had not been so noticeable.

The Fall session of 1919, which opened on Sept. 26, however, saw a great change in the line-up of members in the House. F. F. Pardee (West Lambton) and Hon. W. S. Fielding (Shelburne and Queen's) were both elected as supporters of the Liberal benches. Hon. F. B. Carvell, another Liberal Unionist had been appointed chairman of the Railway Commission on relinquishing his portfolio of Minister of Public Works, and several members had left the government benches to form what was then known as the "Cross-Benchers" or third group in the House.

Further Defections. The opening of the 1921 session, on February 14, saw further defections from the government benches and one defection from the Liberal strength. F. L. Davis (Neepawa) and J. A. Campbell (Neison) sought seats among the Independents when they came into the House in 1921, to which group Major G. W. Andrews had crossed and they were joined by W. A. Buchanan also from the Government side and by L. J. Gauthier (Ste. Hyacinthe) who renounced his former associates of the Liberal party and announced that henceforth he would be independent.

Hon. A. K. Maclean, who had been Minister without Portfolio in the Borden Government, had announced at the end of the 1920 session that he would, the next year, ask for a seat among the Liberals, and he sat on the Opposition side when the 1921 session opened.

The standing of the parties in the House at the close of the 1921 session was: Government 125; Liberals, 82; Progressive's 14, and Independents, 6.

Small Majorities. The majority of the Government on votes during the 1920 and 1921 sessions fluctuated considerably according to the issue at stake, attendance of members and also according to the attitude of the National Progressives and Independents. During the 1921 session the majority generally was in the neighborhood of from 20 to 25.

The vote on the address in reply to the speech from the throne (1921 session) stood: Government 116; Opposition 94, a majority of 25 for the Government. There were eight pairs when this vote was taken. On the Fielding reciprocity amendment the vote was: Government 100; Opposition 79; a majority of 21.

There were 32 members paired on this vote.
