Now that the weather is showing signs of becoming more settled, more hunters are planning to go out in quest of fowl and deer. The deer, it is reported are still pretty high in the hills and one has to climb a good deal to locate them. With the prospect of a long drag out to the water if one is taken, the hunting cannot be said to be fully attractive just yet. In a few weeks it will be better. It is said that the ducks and geese have not arrived in full numbers yet either but the latter should soon be winging their way south for the winter. The season is not at its best yet.

Talking about "tours" for ball clubs this fall, Mexico seems to be offering attractions now that the country is at peace again. Baseball is making wonderful strides in the Oregon nation. Among teams that will go to that country this winter are the Dallas and San Antonio clubs of the Texas League. They plan a trip that will take them to Mexico City where they will play a six game series, under a guarantee already deposited in a bank. Americans from the States are flocking into Mexico in large numbers and are carrying the gospel of baseball to their fellow Americans south of the border. If the Guggenheims and such do not spoil the picture the game is due for a big success in Mexico, but it remains to be seen if graft and politics can be curbed to give it a real chance.

Long Beach, that seashore resort selected by writers of musical comedies wherever an American Ostend is desired for a scene, now has become an all-around-the-year community. The bathing girls will not be playing on the sands, but safely tucked away from the breakers will be many summer residents, who have put up substantial houses. The largest hotel has announced that it will remain open all winter, and if the majority of the summer residents remain, the villages will have enough population to become a third class city. High rents in New York are believed to have caused many folks to remain throughout the winter.

The highest batting average by a team in the World Series games since 1906 was made by the Philadelphia Athletics in the series of 1910 against the Chicago Cubs. Connie Mack's organization of youthful stars batted .317 in that year, 96 points better than the Cubs. It is a significant fact that the pennant winning Cub teams of other days were great fielding organizations, and in all their world series, excepting that of 1910 they outthrew their opponents. This was noticeable in the 1918 series against the Red Sox and, though they lost, they batted as a team .210 against the Sox .786. The Sox fielded remarkably in the series, however, having only one error chalked against them, with a fielding average of .996. This by the way, was the best fielding performance of any team since 1905.

## BASKETBALL IS NOT PROMISING

### Poor Attendance at Annual Meeting Last Night—New Officers Elected.

There was a rather poor attendance at the annual meeting of the Basketball Association which was held in the council chamber last night. Only 18 turned out, that number not being nearly as large as last year; in fact, the attendance record was very disappointing. The secretary's annual report was read and shows a balance on hand of \$86.65. The election of officers then took place and resulted as follows:

Secretary—George S. Russell, pro tem.

There was a general discussion as regards the suggested changes in the rules. The number of players allowed each club was reduced from 10 to 7. Classification of the leagues was made as follows:  
Juniors—Sixteen years and under.  
Intermediate—No age limit. Players in this league can only play two senior games without becoming disqualified.

The matter of playing quarters was discussed and it was left with the president and secretary to interview L. J. Marren, proprietor of the skating rink, and the executive of the Exhibition Association as to possible terms.

### Entries Close Oct. 15.

All entries are to close on October 15 at which time a better idea will be obtainable as to the prospects for the coming season.

Fred Gilhuly, past president, was tendered the thanks of the association for his work during the past two years.

## ORGANIZING HOCKEY FOR COMING WINTER

### Two Saskatchewan Teams Say They Will Not Play Professional Game.

MOOSE JAW, Sask., Oct. 5.—Regina and Moose Jaw will not be represented in a Saskatchewan professional hockey league, if such a circuit is to be formed this winter, according to information gathered here. Two prominent Regina hockey men in the city and stated emphatically that the Regina Victorias, last year's champions, would not turn pro and had already lined up the members of the championship club for the amateur game again this year. The Maple Leafs, of this city, some time ago decided to stick to amateur hockey. Thus, if a professional league is to be organized—and Regina and Moose Jaw hockey moguls are skeptical on the matter—it will have to look elsewhere than among the 1920 amateurs for its talent.

## Saskatoon For "Pros."

SASKATOON, Oct. 5.—If Regina and Moose Jaw hockey officials are adamant in their decision to stick to the amateur game this winter Saskatoon will accept the offer of Lloyd Turner, of Calgary, who has invited local promoters to enter the Alberta "Big Four" league. R. M. Pinder, chief backer of the Crescents, declared this morning, "Saskatoon doesn't want any more "amateur" hockey and fans are keen to see a fast professional team represent this city.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.  
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.  
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties may operate as joint tenants with joint residence, but each making separate improvements on respective claims.  
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1/2 acre before receiving Crown grant.  
Where pre-emptor in occupation less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be allowed to receive Crown grant.  
Records without permanent residence may be issued on occupation less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be allowed to receive Crown grant.
