Ten Years to Return To Normal Prosperity.

None but a person writing for so much a word would attempt to prove the probability of an early return to war-time, pre-war time, or the immediate post-war time prosperity we have just left behind, says C. H. Carlisle, general manager of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. of Canada.

The economic history of other great wars proves the futility of such a hope. Dating from the armistice, a ten-year period will probably be required to effect a complete return to normal prosperity. Given that time without further great eruptions to annoy us, the world will doubtless enter upon another long cycle of peace and progress.

Conditions in our own country will improve faster than average world conditions, to be sure. Proof of that improvement is already at hand. There is a quickening in many lines of industry, especially the automobile industry. The conservative buying period which our people have inflicted on themselves for several months past is over.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

APPLICATIONS FOR GRAZING PERMITS UNDER GRAZING ACT 1919.

Applications for permits to graze livestock on the Crown range within each Grazing District of the Province of British Columbia during the grazing season of 1921 must be filed with the District Foresters at Cariboo, Cranbrook, Fort George, Kamloops, Nelson, Prince Rupert, Vancouver, Vernon or with the Commissioner of Grazing, Department of Lands at Victoria, B. C., on or before March 31, 1921.

Blank forms upon which to submit applications may be obtained from the District Foresters at the above named places or from the Department of Lands at Victoria.

The grazing of livestock on the Crown range without permit constitutes trespass, prohibited by law. G. B. NADEN, Deputy Minister of Lands, Department of Lands, Victoria, B. C., January 24th, 1921.

SELLS HAIR TO HELP COUNTRY

English Girl Tries to Set Example of Patriotism, but Others Fail to Follow

LONDON, Feb. 18.—An English girl has just set an example of patriotism to her sisters of this or other countries by cutting off and selling her hair and giving the proceeds to the government to relieve its financial situation.

Her letter announcing her sacrifice as received at a government office reads:

"To help, though even in a small way, the country in the present financial difficulties, I have had my hair cut off and have sold it. With the money thus obtained I have bought War Savings Certificates which I have destroyed. The money is thus a direct gift to the country. If this could be published, perhaps many other girls would do as I have done and thousands of people would be encouraged to give up something that would benefit the country financially."

The letter was published, but emulators of the writer's example have not been heard. A reason may be found in a recent decree of hairdressers that "bobbed" locks are no longer fashionable.

LONDON POLICE USE MOTOR VEHICLES IN DETECTION OF CRIME

LONDON, Feb. 15.—The year 1920 was remarkable for the great progress made by the Metropolitan Police in methods of preventing and detecting crime of every description. General Horwood, the commissioner, is a firm believer in the importance of motor-vehicles as an aid to the police, and it is in this direction that the improvements have been largely carried out.

Uniform and detective superintendents have now their own automobiles in which they can rapidly go from one point to another of their large districts.

Motor-cycle side cars are kept at various police stations for the use of officers in case of emergency and divisional detective inspectors have their motorcycles and side-cars to drive to the scene of a crime or to visit outlying stations.

London's Mounties

The mounted police, too, under Colonel Laurie, have been reorganized, their equipment improved and the men mounted on some of the finest horses in the country. Under the new organization a large body of mounted police can be concentrated in any part of London within half an hour.

The effect of these improvements has been seen in the extraordinary number of clever captures that have been made of burglars, pickpockets and other criminals. The flying squads of detectives attached to New Scotland Yard, working independently under the "Big Four" detectives, have done well in rounding up housebreakers and breaking up gangs of thieves who infest tube stations, trains and omnibuses.
