BESNER PARTY GOT A DUCKING

New Studebaker Car Backed Over Government Wharf into Water Yesterday.

WONDERFUL ESCAPE

An accident that might have been fraught with most tragic results, occurred yesterday afternoon on the Government wharf, when a car belonging to Oliver Besner of the Knox Hotel, was suddenly precipitated over the side of the dock a distance of at least twenty feet.

Mr. Besner, who returned from Vancouver on the Prince Rupert yesterday morning, bringing with him the motor car in question, a 60 horsepower Studebaker Sedan, which he had purchased in the south, and intended to use in connection with his hotel business, had been running the car around the city shortly after his arrival accompanied by his wife. The latter had returned to the hotel, and Mr. Besner, who has not so far had much experience in operating motor cars, took on board three friends from the hotel to demonstrate his prowess as a budding chauffeur.

Backed Into Water.

All went well as they toured around the city, their prearrangements, finally taking them down to the Government wharf. It was here that the first semblance of trouble appeared on the horizon. Mr. Besner is endeavoring to negotiate a turn with the view of proceeding up town, again, apparently, got slightly mixed up with the various levers that operate the advance and backing up of the car. Instead of going forward as he desired, the powerful machine, insisted on backing until it became perilously near the edge of the wharf, in close proximity to the heavy square timber, that acts as a guard. Several on-lookers as well as the cars occupants, drew Mr. Besner's attention to the refractory attitude taken by the machine. The next thing that happened, to the amazement of the numerous on-lookers who stood spellbound on the wharf, was that the car, regardless of the guard rail, backed gracefully off the dock with its four occupants closely shut in and disappeared from view under the waters of the harbor.

All Were Rescued.

A few moments later to the wonder of the appalled spectators, one by one four men bobbed up to the surface water, shaking themselves, and gasping for breath, but apparently not much the worse for their ducking. They were promptly assisted to reach shore and taken home, where warm clothes and other attentions, soon put them out of danger of any serious results from the catastrophe.

None of the men in question are able to give a very lucid account of how they managed to release themselves from the enclosed car. The latter is being raised today, a diver having gone down with the view of sizing up the damage, and aiding in the work of getting it out of the water, so that it may again be put in commission.
