SUING G. T. P. ON CHARGE OF NEGLIGENCE

EDMONTON, Nov. 8.—Alleging that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway negligently allowed a fire from their engines to spread and burn down a shack and all their furniture, which was stored in it at Gainford, William Kynock, John R. Kynock, Margaret Kynock and A. S. Matheson have entered civil action against the company in the Supreme Court and are suing for the sum of \$3000.

The case came to trial before Chief Justice Harvey and jury on Monday morning, with Gerald Pelton acting for the plaintiffs and Short, Cross & McLean for the defendant railway and the following jurors taking the evidence: Richard R. Askew, Edmonton; O. J. Elder, Wainwright; Harry Brake, Edmonton; Samuel Nicholls, Edmonton; E. Rodgers, Telford and Peter Boyle, Edmonton.
