Heavy Artillery of American Leaguers Was Working Strong Again With Two Homers By Lazzeri— Combs and Demaree One Each

CHICAGO, Oct. 3:- The great slugging proclivities of the American Leaguers and the pitching weakness of the National League pennant winners, deciding factors in the first three games, again settled the issue in the fourth game of the World Series at Wrigley Field here yesterday when the New York Yankees defeated Chicago by a score of 13 to 6 to capture the world's baseball championship in

the four straight games. The New#-Yorkers set up a new record in winning three World Series in straight games having won in 1927 and 1928 in four straight. Wilcey More, relieving Johnny Allen during the first inning, although replaced by Herb Pennock on the Yanker mound in the seventh inning, was credited with the victory. The Cubs used no less than five pitchers-Guy Bush, Lon Warnecke, Jakie May, Bud Tinning and Burleigh Grimes-in the desperate eleventh hour endeavor to recoup their fading chances but it was all to no avail in the face of the great Yan-
