NEW BRUNSWICK AND
LIQUOR REFERENDUM

ST. JOHN, N.B., May 20.—There is no indication as yet as to when the Province of New Brunswick may expect a referendum vote on the question of the importation of liquor. The resolution requesting the Federal authorities to set a date for such a vote, passed the Legislature without a dissenting voice. There were only two speeches made in connection with the matter. It is thought, however, that there will be no poll until the fall. Premier W. E. Foster will be in England most of the summer, and residents of the province are not anxious to vote during the vacation months when the poll would not be as representative as it might at another time.

The plebiscite may be held in October. At any rate it is not likely that it will be held before that time.

SEA DOGS ARE
PLAYING HAVOC

Injure Fishermen's Nets on At-
lantic Coast; Fish Prices
Down

ST. JOHN, N.B., May 20.—Sea-dogs are playing havoc with the fishing business in the mouth of the St. John River and adjoining waters. They are more numerous this season than for sometime past and their attacks upon nets and weirs are more disastrous, fishermen say, than ever before. A sea-dog is a good-sized seal and quite capable of making a great hole in a fishing net. Some nets have almost been ruined by the animals. Not only are the sea-dogs damaging the fishing gear, but their presence in the waters is driving away schools of fish from the vicinity. As a result the takes are much smaller than usual and on bad days the fishermen frequently secure only about one hundred fish. Before the sea-dogs came in such numbers, they were accustomed to taking three or four thousand fish daily.

Prices are Low
To add to the troubles of the fishermen the price paid for gasperaux is very low this year, about a cent and a half apiece at the wharf. They sell for ten cents on the public market.

The fishing industry generally is in a very unsettled state at the present time. There have been drastic reductions in prices and the market is pretty well flooded. Factories have considerable stocks on hand. The sardine plants at the lower end of the Bay of Fundy are particularly well off in this respect.

TAKE GRAIN
FROM FARMERS

Drastic Action by Soviet Con-
gress is Sorrowful Necessity,
Says Paper.

MOSCOW, May 19.—A decree issued by the soviet government to put into effect the decision of the last Soviet Congress permits trade in surplus foodstuffs under certain restrictions, says a report here from Moscow.

It provides that 144,000,000 bushels of the 210,000,000 bushels of grain necessary for the feeding of the towns and cities shall be taken from the farmers by levy; the remainder to be purchased from them by giving them in exchange machinery, cloth, iron and other articles.

Must Pay Taxes.
Freedom of trade is to be permitted only in districts which have paid their taxes.

It will be necessary, it is said, to obtain the machinery for the farmers from abroad, but the other commodities could be produced at home except for the breakdown of production due to the lack of fuel and raw materials.

For the present the only produce for exchange with the peasants is salt and oil. Here again, it is pointed out, there is a difficulty in the matter of transportation, although both salt and oil themselves are abundant.

All control and restrictions affecting the transport of supplies are abolished. Punishment is provided, however, for selling grain without saving seed.

Hands Forced.

The decree is regarded by the newspaper Pravda as a sorrowful necessity. The government, it says, was compelled to issue the order to induce the peasants to labor on their land. The Russian farmer had threatened to leave much of their holdings uncultivated so there would be nothing to confiscate.
