## LIQUOR MONOPOLY BEING ASKED BY PROVINCE FISH CAR SITUATION REVIEWED BY THE EDITOR OF FISH TRADE JOURNAL

### EDITORIAL

#### WATERFRONT.

Plans are being made in the city that the Provincial Government has refused to give the city any waterfront. Statements are not correct. A letter was read from Mr. D. Pallullo, member for Prince Rupert, at the recent meeting of the City Council in which he stated to be a party to a deal for waterfront property for which rights which he did not have. It seemed to me that the pressure was being put on the city when the minister was always ready to consider anything without any such pressure. Anything which can be done for the benefit of the city.

On several occasions, Mr. Pallullo told the city that if they could show that they need a waterfront lot for a specific purpose, if the property is available, the city will get it. If it is to be handed over to the city, it is to be held until it happens to meet it. Mr. Pallullo considers the Provincial Government just as good as the people's property. That is the way he looks at it. There is nothing to indicate that his mind has changed. The fishermen's float.

Years ago or thereabouts, the fishermen secured for the use of their boats and other boats a fine little float at Cow Bay. This was as large a float as they were able to build on the waterfront. The fishermen pay nothing for the use of the floats and they are kept up at the expense of the Provincial Government, whereas if they were kept up by the city, they would be kept up by the city. It would be a matter of handing over the care of the waterfront from the larger to the smaller.

It is in the public interest to believe that if there is a waterfront needed in the neighborhood of Cow Bay, the Provincial Government, if available, they will be willing to hand it over to the city, if the city shows that it is to be used in the public interest. They have not refused to give it, but they have more than once to hand it to the city to be held by and not used, just as many applications have been refused.

### PARLIAMENTARY CABINET IS BUSY ON ESTIMATES

## Canadian Fisherman Editor Reviews the Fish Car Grievance

### Complete Review of Situation with very Caustic Comment by Wallace, Secretary of the Canadian Fisheries Association

For the establishment of a distinct and enlarged Fisheries Administration at Ottawa, no better argument can be advanced than to give herewith some idea of how the fishing industry of Prince Rupert, B. C., has been stifled and held back from its legitimate development by the Canadian National Railways, says F. S. Wallace in the Canadian Fisherman under the caption of "Strangling an Industry."

In all our experience of the many drawbacks which militate against the proper development of our Canadian fisheries, we have never seen anything to equal the nonchalant manner in which the officials of the Canadian Government Railway Systems have treated the urgent needs of a great industry, and the whole story is one of "passing the buck," unfulfilled promises, humbug and absolute indifference.

### WOULD KEEP COW BAY OPEN

Resolution Offered by C. O. Rowe at Board of Trade Meeting Last Night Passed to Committee.

A resolution submitted to the Board of Trade by C. O. Rowe last night with regard to the dredging of Cow Bay was referred to the committee appointed to deal with the matter with the name of Mr. Rowe added thereto. The resolution follows:

"Whereas, the land surrounding and the bed of Cow Bay belongs to the Canadian National Railway's under agreement with the provincial government dated March 16, 1918.

"And whereas, the provincial government has refused to grant the city of Prince Rupert waterfrontage for civic use.

"And whereas, the cost of excavation would not be excessive and the material excavated could be used for the building of the necessary wharves and piers.

"Be it resolved that the Dominion Government of Canada give the matter of carrying out the following improvements to the inner harbor at Cow Bay in the harbor of Prince Rupert its earnest consideration and support, to wit: The dredging of the inner harbor to a sufficient depth of water at all stages of the tides for safe entrance and anchorage, and the provision of wharves and landing stages and other facilities necessary to the speedy handling of business between boats and shore."

### CREDITORS HOLD BACK EQUIPMENT

At Meeting This Afternoon Revoke Former Decision.

(Special 2:45 p. m.)  
VANCOUVER, March 5.—After a meeting of the creditors this morning, W. E. Hodges announces that the creditors have decided to withhold the dry dock equipment after being advised that R. L. Reid, K. C., gave notice yesterday of the government's reserving the right to appeal from the recent finding turning the equipment over to the creditors. The completion of the ships is thus still held up.

VICTORIA, March 5.—Application to the Dominion Government to enact legislation during the present session prohibiting importation of intoxicating liquor into British Columbia except through the provincial government is to be made, according to a motion introduced into the Legislature by Premier Oliver yesterday.

This step is being taken in view of the belief that the province has not the power to prevent importation of liquor or to impose a special tax of \$2.50 a bottle on all such importations as proposed in the original draft of the Moderation Bill.

The sudden terminating of the debate on the motion for the second reading of the liquor bill after four short speeches by Burde of Alberni, Henniger of Grand Forks, Uphill of Fernie and Kerzin of Atlin. As no other members were desirous of speaking the motion for the second reading unanimously passed.

### SHIPYARD IS STILL WORKING

Telegram From Vancouver Leaves Everything Uncertain But Men Still Employed.

The shipbuilding situation remains rather uncertain, but in the meantime the Wallace company has 75 men employed and no orders have yet been received to stop working on construction.

Word was received here last night through the Canadian Press Ltd. confirming the special despatch published in the Daily News yesterday and adding "Hodges says further delay must arise in the completion of the two government ships."

D. G. Stewart, one of the inspectors representing local creditors, said this morning he had received no word from Vancouver but he personally was in favor of trying to settle with the government as soon as possible and not interfering with the progress of work on the ships. He intimated that there was nothing to be gained from fighting the government. He thought terms could be arranged.

Mr. Clark, representing the liquidator, had, up to the time of going to press, received no word countermanning the order to hand over everything to the government.

### BARTER SALMON FOR WET GOODS

Government Vendor Goes to Old Country to Arrange Purchases.

VICTORIA, March 5.—The attorney-general announces that H. A. Urquhart, government liquor vendor at Vancouver, has been despatched to the Old Country in connection with purchases to be made by British Columbia when liquor control becomes effective.

He will secure information in regard to securing a supply direct from the distilleries and will go into the question of bartering British Columbia salmon for liquor.

An explanation was received by the Board of Trade at the meeting last night as to why the Chekanawa was sent south for repairs. It was explained by the department that it was simply for the purpose of changing her engine.
