The Mayor and aldermen at last night's meeting of the city council passed a motion, instructing the city clerk to convey a message of condolence to Mrs. Macdonald and family in the sad bereavement they have undergone through the death of the late Lieutenant Wilfred G. Macdonald.

A letter was read at last night's council meeting from H. A. Duhamel, asking for a refund of the unexpired portion of a beverage license taken out by him which became valueless upon the going into effect of the Liquor Control Act. The letter was ordered laid on the table for a week, and the city clerk was instructed to communicate with the Attorney General's department upon what action should be taken in these cases.

A letter was read at the meeting of the city council last night from a man named Washington Irvine in regard to injuries he claims to have received through falling off a sidewalk, while listening to music of the orchestra at a dance being held at De Luxe Hall on Third Avenue. The railing he was leaning against gave way and he was precipitated into the excavation below. The matter was referred to the attention of the City Solicitor.

The Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co., have written the city council, through their local representative E. F. Duly, in regard to the obtaining water from the city to operate a sulphite plant. Negotiations have been going on for some little time. They request to be allowed to use 3000 gallons per minute at certain periods during the 24 hours, in order to make up for this, they propose to install a "Booster pump" and state they will guarantee to keep the reservoir full continually. The council at last night's meeting was in favor of allowing the concession, providing they have a proper agreement safeguarding the city's interests.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert
