SPEAKERS AT ROTARY CLUB

M. A. Macdonald, F. G. Congdon and J. Kingham Give Interesting Addresses at Luncheon.

There were three interesting addresses at the Victoria Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by F. G. Congdon, and M. A. Macdonald of Vancouver and Joshua Kingham of Victoria.

Interest in Reform In every community it was wise to train men to deal with matters of legislation and it seemed strange that businessmen often did not realize the value of taking an interest in legislation for the betterment of the community.

Revolutionary Impulse. Speaking of the revolutionary impulse, which at the present time was very strong in the world, the speaker suggested that while a certain amount of evolutionary sentiment was essential to the welfare of the community, it was not well to be too much possessed with the idea.
