Japanese Steamer Sinks off Flattery All Reported Saved

SEATTLE, Oct. 28.—Freighter West Ivan is proceeding toward Yokohama today with the crew and passengers of the Japanese steamer Kiku Maru, which sank last night in a hurricane 1200 miles off Cape Flattery. Details are lacking. News of the vessel foundering was sent out by the West Ivan early this morning. All aboard are reported to have been saved. It is believed the vessel carried a number of passengers. She was on her way to Kobe when she was damaged in a storm several days ago, and it was reported that she was returning to Seattle for repairs.

TORONTO LIBRARY ISSUES 5 BOOKS EVERY 2 MINUTES

TORONTO, Oct. 28.—The reading of books is still on the increase. A total of 131,000 books from the Toronto public libraries were read by the general public during September, according to the chief librarian. It represents an increase of 25,000 books over September, 1920. Last Saturday five books were given out every two minutes during the day of 12 hours at the College Street library. In one room at this library which is the chief one in the city, 23,951 books were taken out during the month.
