Whole Question of Irish Free State Status to Be Discussed At Conference on Wednesday

To Get Together Tomorrow

DUBLIN, Oct. 4:—The Irish Free State governent announces that President Eamonn de Valera Will go to London tomorrow to resume conversations with Rt. Hon. James H. Thomas, Secretary for the Dominions, on issues of far wider significance than land annuities. The whole status of the country is expected to be introduced into Wednesday's conference and the attitude of the United Kingdom is seen as a deciding factor as to whether or not the Irish Free State will remain within the British Commonwealth.

It is believed that a successor to Governor General McNeill will not be named in the meantime. The duties of his office will be transferred to the office of the chief justice of the Free State until de Valera receives a mandate from the country to assimilate the position into the presidency.
