**Commissioner's Office
 Said to be Dead.**

"Shipping and Exporting Register" has some comment to
 make on the office of Canadian High Commissioner in London
 and that rather derogatory to the present occupants of Govern-
 ment positions there. It says:

"Dead as Caesar's wife," is the way the Hon. Mr. Foster,
 premier of New Brunswick, characterizes the offices of the High
 Commissioner for Canada in London. In a statement to the press
 upon his return to Canada, Premier Foster said some things about
 this office which are anything but complimentary. He ended up
 by advising a general shake-up, if Canadian trade interests in
 the United Kingdom are to be guarded with any amount of success.

"As soon as his statements were published the Department
 of Trade and Commerce at Ottawa denied that the High Com-
 missioner's office had anything to do with them. The duties of
 this personage, it was stated from the trade and commerce de-
 partment, was semi-diplomatic—at any rate it was none of their
 business.

**Little Complimentary
 About the Office.**

"Possibly it is not—at least not directly. The Department of
 Trade and Commerce has troubles of its own, not to be bothered
 with the High Commissioner's activities. As to the latter office,
 it would be to the point to make inquiries. Premier Foster is
 hardly the man to form bigoted or rash opinions. His idea of the
 London High Commissioner's office is heartily shared with many
 other Canadians of less illustrious official standing. The Cana-
 dian representative in London has come in for a great deal of
 honors, especially during the war, and immediately after. In the
 latter months, little has been heard of complimentary nature
 about the London office, however. Canadians in London, indeed,
 are urged to sign their names in a big register, and the names
 are faithfully cabled to some of the Canadian dailies. Premier
 Foster apparently was not quite content to affix his name in the
 visitor's register, but found the other departments sadly lacking.

"It is more than important that the office of the High Com-
 missioner in London—like Caesar's wife—be both free from
 blame and suspicion. There is no suspicion of dishonesty, but
 there is a criticism which looks much like 'soft jobs' for a few
 gentlemen in that office, who could spend their time better in
 aiding our trade a little and not indulge too deeply in 'semi-
 diplomatic matters.'"

**Fort Norman Oil
 And Its Development.**

It is impossible for a person who does not understand the
 oil situation to intelligently discuss the future of Fort Norman
 and its possible effect on the future of any part of Canada and
 especially of this coast. The return of the prospecting party to
 Dawson, as reported yesterday, is however confirmation of the
 former statements in regard to quantity of oil, quality of product
 and depth at which it is found. If it is an oil that can be piped to
 the coast, it seems altogether likely that it will come either to
 Prince Rupert or to Stewart with a possibility of Vancouver being
 the outlet.

It is useless to argue about the rival outlets. The company,
 when it gets to work, will have all the information available in
 regard to routes and will weigh everything carefully. On the
 evidence of experts it will decide where the outlet is to be. In
 the meantime the field will be more thoroughly tested and it will
 be decided more definitely than at present whether the field is
 likely to be a permanent one and what is the possible output.

The world needs oil today and it is possible that in ten years'
 time it will need oil much worse than it does today, unless some
 other fuel is discovered or developed. Having that in view the
 Imperial Oil Company doubtless feels it has nothing to gain by
 moving too fast. It will move as Standard Oil has always moved,
 with precision but with determination. The oil will be taken
 out if there is enough of it. We may be sure of that. It must
 be thoroughly proved before anyone is likely to invest many
 millions of dollars in tapping it and bringing it to the coast.

 NEW TEACHERS**

About 100 Applications for Five
 Positions on Local School
 Staffs.

There were about 100 applica-
 tions received at the meeting of
 the School Board last evening
 for five positions on the local
 public and high school staffs.
 These five positions were filled
 but applications have not yet
 been received for the position of
 commercial leader in connec-
 tion with the High School which
 will commence next session.

H. W. Harkness, formerly of
 the Anxox teaching staff, has
 been appointed vice principal
 of the local schools.
 Miss Mary E. Mahaffey, of
 Vernon, has been appointed
 teacher of Modern Languages at
 the High School succeeding Miss
 M. V. McEnaghan, resigned.
 Miss Mahaffey is an experienced
 teacher and received her train-
 ing in Ireland.

Other appointments to the
 public school teaching staff were
 Miss Rita Maloney, sister of T.
 Maloney, of this city, and
 formerly of Sandspit school;
 William Sims, of Vancouver, and
 Miss Helen Hibbard, of this city.

**GOOD PROGRESS IS
 MADE NEW SCHOOL**

Some Rooms Will Be Ready in
 a Fortnight—All Finished
 in September.

Good progress is being made
 on the construction of the new
 school at Hays Cove and soon
 the putting on of the finishing
 touches will commence. In the
 course of a fortnight, some of
 the rooms will be ready to re-
 ceive the desks and the whole
 building will be ready for oc-
 cupancy by the time the fall
 school session resumes in Sep-
 tember.

It was decided at last night's
 meeting of the school board to
 take out \$50,000 insurance on
 the new building. This will be
 increased later when the con-
 struction is finished and the
 equipment has been moved in.

**ELIMINATE WOMEN
 FROM THE BANKS**

Refusal to Accept Transfers is
 Serious Drawback to Their
 Employment.

Making way for male em-
 ployees, the tendency will be to
 eliminate the women bank clerks
 and that governing the im-
 mediate future girl employees
 will not be favored in the ser-
 vice of Canadian banking insti-
 tutions, says the Financial Post.
 The woman banker, while ac-
 cepted as a success up to a cer-
 tain position under the Cana-
 dian system of branch banking,
 after a six year test, has proved
 to be a serious stumbling block
 to the promotion system. Prob-
 ably ninety per cent of the
 women clerks will not accept
 transfers from branch to branch.
 As a result the promotion system
 as evolved out of a period of
 many years' Canadian banking
 practice is said recently to have
 seriously broken down.

War Change.

Among all the changes which
 business conditions of recent
 years brought about in Canadian
 banks, undeniably the most out-
 standing was the throwing open
 of new positions to women.
 Prior to the war, girls were not
 employed in Canadian banks in
 a clerking capacity. The depen-
 dency of staffs when the men
 went to the front first opened
 the way for women. The tremen-
 dous business expansion im-
 mediately following the cessa-
 tion of war continued the need
 of retaining female workers to
 supplement.

Large Ratio.

Complete figures have never
 been available to fully indicate
 the strength of women bankers
 in the Dominion but that the
 ratio is considerable is indicated
 in the announcements of two
 of the larger banking insti-
 tutions, one of which recently re-
 ported that of a staff of 2,400
 more than 700 were women,
 and the other of a staff of 1,300
 some 400 were women.

 is the same. The range of the
 tide may be computed as 5 per
 cent greater at Prince Rupert
 than at Port Simpson both at
 springs and neaps. Therefore
 the rise in the Prince Rupert
 harbor is slightly greater than
 Port Simpson.
 The height is in feet and
 tenths of feet above the average
 level of lower low water.


