Has There Been Political Camouflage?

Has there been political camouflage in connection with the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian Merchant Marine? The Government controls these businesses and refuses to allow details of management to be made public. The result is the people are suspicious that something is "being put over." There have been a good many outspoken people who have declared that the management of the railway at the instigation of the Government is lying in regard to its financial condition. It is trying to hide its incompetence. We believe that under present circumstances the people have a right to know exactly where they stand so that they may deal intelligently with their own business. If we were shareholders of a private company we should want to know.

Get Together Is Good Policy.

This is a time when the North should stand as a unit. The people should get together. Unhappily we are hampered by distance and high costs of transportation, but there is no reason why there should not be much closer co-operation between the scattered communities of Northern British Columbia. We cannot have a separate province. That is pretty certain, but we can have a unity of purpose and a desire to move forward along similar lines, helping each other and working hand in hand for development of the north country.

After the redistribution is passed we shall look for more members in the north. We want as many as possible, based not only on population but on the extent of territory to be covered. Prince Rupert city should have a member of its own, and the district another. That would help us locally. The other sections of the north should also have increased representation. Fort George at present includes the Peace River, a district which should have its own member.

We do not think a redistribution should be effected yet as every year will give the north an advantage. The Peace River is filling up this year and there will be more farmers come into the interior. The mining districts will improve and by the time there is need of making plans for another provincial election we shall be able to command greater attention.

Effort to Secure

Improved University.

The faculty and students of the University of B.C. have been sending out printed forms for friends of the university to sign and to be forwarded to the minister of education. The preamble says:

In order to gain your co-operation in procuring a more liberal government policy towards the advancement of the University of B.C., I beg to call your attention to the following facts:

1. The temporary buildings in which the students are obliged to take lectures are hopelessly inadequate. The class-rooms are often overcrowded, principally because there are not enough professors among whom the work may be divided. Even as it is, some of the professors find it necessary to deliver the same lecture several times in order to accommodate all the students.
2. The necessary equipment for a proper and efficient education is lacking in practically every department.
3. The University is without athletic facilities of any nature whatsoever. The students are obliged to depend upon the King Edward High School and Normal School for campus and gymnasium privileges, granted for only a few periods a week and at very inconvenient hours.

It would take several pages to describe in detail the inconveniences under which the students are working, and I feel that not only the students, but the parents and the provincial taxpayers, are being done an injustice, because it cannot be expected that our young men and women can be trained to the highest point of efficiency under such conditions. It is just such highly-trained young men and women that the province is so much in need of at the present time.

If the present policy of the government be persisted in, it will lead to greater inefficiency, the loss of some of the best professors, and an undemocratic policy of limiting the number of students.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

ANOTHER WAGE CUT AT ANYOX

General Reduction Wages 25c a Day with Accompanying Drop in Board of 5c

ANYOX, April 9.—There was a general cut of wages in the Granby smelter and mine here on March 31, but operations are still going on and the reduction of 25c a day was accepted by the employees with good grace. The drop in wages was accompanied by a reduction of 5c a day in board.

The workers at Anyox realize the seriousness of the situation, with copper at such a low level. The Granby Company is the only copper producing concern on the continent that is still carrying on operations in full swing.

STORY OF COLLEGE AND POLITICAL LIFE

BETS HE'LL STRIKE OIL BEFORE JULY 1

Says the Interior News:

The recent oil strike within a mile of Burns Lake town-site bids fair to swamp the local hotels, as many prairie people are showing great interest. Donald M. Gerow, the discoverer, having interested several Eastern people, called in the services of John Gunderson, a well known coal and petroleum expert, who was so pleased with the indications that he immediately took an interest with the Gerow brothers, who have been prospecting and investigating the slowings for the past three years. Several old time prospectors and a good many new comers are camped in the adjoining hills, but everything possible is being done to prevent anything approaching a boom.

The locations already made are in a rolling country, lightly timbered with spruce and pine which has been destroyed by fire. The formations are chiefly conglomerates and shale, and in spots where the oil exuded an analysis by the expert pronounced it to be crude petroleum. Mr. Gerow expects to commence drilling immediately on his return and is betting that he will strike oil before July 1.
