Co-operation in All Lines of Endeavor.

Co-operation is desirable in all lines of endeavor. In the sphere of religious activities, the Anglicans and Presbyterians have shown a fine sense of the fitness of things by agreeing on a system of co-operation in the mission fields of this country. There is to be no attempt to elbow the other out or to overcrowd any particular place by reason of denominational ambition.

The same spirit may be carried into every line of activity. Wholesome competition is useful in that it tends to betterment, but cut throat competition is injurious. In business today there is a tendency to get together and all work for the good of the community. In the various businessmen's clubs, which are the fashion today, such as the Rotary Club, the motto is "service." They recognize that service to the community is the first duty of a businessman. Necessarily he expects to be paid for that service, but it is the service and not the money making that should be the first aim.

Much Interest Taken In Session of Legislature.

Much interest is taken in the session of the Provincial Legislature which opens at Victoria today. In the first place everyone is anxious to know exactly what the provisions of the new liquor bill will be. There will be a good deal to do in connection with making specific regulations in connection with the sealed bottles, which will be on sale at the government dispensaries.

There will be other legislation, but on the whole it is not expected the session will be a long one. As a rule we are afflicted with too much legislation instead of too little. Legislation does not help us much. Usually increased legislation means increased taxation and no one is anxious for that just now. Taxation has about reached the limit.

Another Effort to Settle Irish Question.

While we are not directly affected here, everyone would like to see a settlement of the Irish troubles. This has been a live question for at least a generation. It is more to the fore today than ever it has been, and its settlement is puzzling the brains of the ablest men in the Empire. The difficulty with the Irish is that they are Irish, at least that is what an Irishman says of them and he ought to know.

Why Be Always Talking of Weather?

Why be always talking about the weather? Everyone knows about it so why discuss it? The only thing interesting about it is in the matter of comparison, either with similar weather at some other time or with the weather at some other place, and even that is a dreadfully dull subject of conversation.

Cats or rats or dogs or pigs are much more interesting subjects to talk about than weather. (Even ladies' hats or men's styles are miles ahead of the weather so far as intrinsic interest. Science and art seem seldom to be heard of, either at the dinner table or at other places where people congregate. Sport is popular in some circles, but the weather, the horrid weather, the most inane subject in the universe, is on everybody's tongue and yet no information is ever imparted in regard to it that is worth a moment of thought.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

February 8, 1911

Applications for permits to graze livestock on the Crown range within each Grazing District of the Province of British Columbia during the grazing season of 1921 must be filed with the District Foresters at Cariboo, Cranbrook, Fort George, Kamloops, Nelson, Prince Rupert, Vancouver, Vernon or with the Commissioner of Grazing, Department of Lands at Victoria, B.C., on or before March 31, 1921.

Blank forms upon which to submit applications may be obtained from the District Foresters at the above named places or from the Department of Lands at Victoria.

The grazing of livestock on the Crown range without permit constitutes trespass, prohibited by law.
