TOLMIE OBJECTS TO CHINESE EGGS

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—Hon. Dr. S. F. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, told the members of the Ottawa Poultry Association Tuesday night that the influx of Chinese eggs into this country was proving to be a menace to the Canadian poultryman. Coming from the western coast, he was fully alive to the situation. "No Canadian can compete with the Chinaman, and I intend looking into this question." The Chinese egg was a cheaply produced low-grade product.

NAVAL COMMANDERS MAY MEET TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS

LONDON, Feb. 2.—In connection with the conference of naval commanders, one report is that representatives of Australia and Canada will meet with the British commanders at Singapore to discuss plans for naval defence of the Pacific and submit recommendations to the Imperial Conference next June.
