AIRPLANE USE IN SURVEYING

Experimental Work in Connection with Reclamation Service North Manitoba.

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—(By Canadian Press)—That he obtained more general information in a two hours' flight in aeroplane than he could have learned in a month's trip on foot is the statement of an engineer of the Reclamation Service who recently made a survey from the air in connection with a drainage project in the hinterland. Reports being received by the Air Board here show that the co-operation of aircraft with the different federal departments is becoming increasingly valued.

This latest example was a special reconnaissance undertaken for the Reclamation Service of the Department of the Interior in the vicinity of Le Pas and Cumberland House, lying on the boundary between Northern Manitoba and Saskatchewan. The survey covered the Carrot River Triangle for a drainage scheme involving the reclaiming for productive purposes, of from 800,000 to 900,000 acres. It had been found that a large part of the area was inaccessible owing to floods; roads and willows made crossing impossible. The Air Board was accordingly requested to arrange a flight over the region, so that an engineer might secure the desired information from the air.

Saves Time and Money.
Reports from the Victoria Beach, Manitoba, air station which was the main base, indicate that the operation was a complete success. Most valuable data was secured in an infinitely shorter period of time than would have been possible by any method of ground transportation, and by no other method could the same general perspective have been arrived at.

The hydraulic engineer of the Reclamation Service commenting on the trip says it is impossible to speak too highly of the benefit derived from a flight of this kind for survey on a project of such magnitude. Much of the district, he says, is unsurveyed, and very little information of the topographical features is obtainable without making a traverse survey. From the air one may see the various channels in the interior quite distinctly, and information of this kind would prove of great value in determining where to run the interior traverse lines and where lines would not be necessary, thereby saving time and money. Information regarding the timber in the interior could also be obtained.

SERVANTS IN PLENTY IN RUSSIA TODAY

PETROGRAD, Nov. 8.—The impression abroad that there are no servants in Russia is an error. One gets a different impression in walking through the Kremlin where cooks and housemaids may be seen throwing water out of the windows of the various apartments where prominent officials of the government live.

And when one tries to hire a cook he finds it is easy enough if a large enough salary and sufficient foodstuffs are offered. The cook in the leading cafe in Moscow is said to be getting 50,000 rubles a day and three square meals.

Tipping is also forbidden by decree, but waiters and other servants not only expect them, but frequently demand them and express a desire for sugar or other foodstuffs, rather than rubles.
