AIRPLANE USE

Experimental Work in Connection with Reclamation Service North Manitoba.

OTTAWA, Nov. 8 .- (By Canadian Press; -- That he obtained more general information in a two hours' flight by aeroplane than he could have learned in a month's trip on foot is the statement of an engineer of the Reports being received by the Air Board here show that the cooperation of aircraft with the different federal departments is becoming increasingly valued.
