WOMAN'S TASK HOME MAKING

Chautauqua Lecturer Says This
Is Most Important Duty of
Her Life.

Miss Lethe Coleman, a clever young speaker with a distinct message, was the lecturer at Chautauqua last evening. Miss Coleman's subject was "The Homing of the People" which was mainly directed to mothers as the central figure in the homes. While Miss Coleman urged the greater participation of women in affairs outside of the home she did not advocate this merely as women's rights but from a broader and better standpoint—that she might be able to make her home better through a closer contact with outside affairs, so that she might understand the interests and problems of her family. Many said that now women had the vote they would clean up governments and politics but this was not the speaker's view. If men had made governments and politics dirty then let men clean them up. She brought home her points forcibly illustrating them with many beautiful and striking natural similes.

Changing Times.

"We are living in the swiftest changing times in all history," declared Miss Coleman. "Even the homes are changing and woman cannot stand still when all about her is going ahead. She should take up the rights and duties of citizenship but, in doing so, should not lose her womanhood. It should have nothing to do with her divine gift and her physical being. Through having the vote she would have a great power in uplifting politics and public morality."

The time for stupid and incapable women was past and in future they would have to be useful and capable. Their basic education and training should prepare them for motherhood, home making and citizenship, all else being secondary to these three faculties. She should participate in outside activities so that she would be able to advise her children wisely and judiciously on the matters which concerned them. She should know what her boys and girls were doing. She will pass into this new state and cease to be a drudge and slave. She is the foundation upon which the nation raises its superstructure.

CANCELLATION OF RESERVE.

Notice is hereby given that the reserve known as the Coal Reserve under the "Coal and Natural Gas Act" of 1920, as published in the British Columbia Gazette on the 23rd of February, 1920, is cancelled, except in so far as the same relates to the following areas:

1. All the lands lying within the boundaries of the drainage areas of the Skeena River above and including both the East Fork of the Nass River, the Little Skeena River and the Spatsi River, above and including Klappan and Indian Creeks.

2. All the lands lying within the boundaries of the following described areas:

Commencing at a point on the West Coast of the Island at the mouth of Muir Creek, thence following the western boundary of the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway belt so far as the same extends, then the North Vancouver Park Reserve, thence west following the south boundary of the said reserve to its west boundary, thence north following the west boundary of the said reserve to its north boundary, thence west along the north boundary of Sayward, and then west along the watershed to the western boundary of the watershed of Nimpkish River, thence west along the western boundary of the said Nimpkish River, Nimpkish Lake and Seine River, to the south boundary of Township 3, Rupert District, thence west along the south boundaries of Township 3, 4 and 5 to Warby Bay, then northwards along the north boundaries of Township 37, 38 and 39 to the Pacific Ocean, and including all the foreshore and lands covered by water adjacent thereto, including the Island, together with all islands lying between the Mainland or the Province south of the said parallel of north latitude and including the islands and all the lands within the boundaries of the District of Goldstream, Metlakatla, Esquimalt, Victoria, Goldstream and North and South Saanich, Sooke and Highland.

The cancellation of this reserve shall not take effect until a notice of such cancellation is published for sixty (60) days in the British Columbia Gazette and in a newspaper published or circulating in each of the Local Registration Districts of the Province of B.C.

This notice shall in no wise affect the reserve against the acquisition of Coal, Petroleum and Natural Gas in the Province of B.C. as established by notice in the British Columbia Gazette on the 27th of March, 1919, which reserve is still in force and effect.
