SONS OF CANADA ADVANCE AGAIN

Defeated Sons of England in Gilhuly Cup Semi-final Last Night—4 to 2.

The Sons of Canada eliminated the Sons of England from the Gilhuly Cup series last night in the semi-final by defeating them in a rather listless game by a score of 4 to 2. There was a good crowd of spectators in attendance but it was a quieter game than usual and excitement did not seem to become worked up until the second half. Play was fairly even throughout but the best team won mainly through the merits of its forward line.

The Canucks played up-hill during the first half and scored three goals in this period through Moffatt, Swan and Robinson. One of the Sons of England scores was made by V. Menzies, a Sons of Canada back, while H. Fanthorpe made the other goal for his side. At half time the score was 3 to 2, Dohbig in the second half, scoring the last goal for the Sons of Canada. Indications point to the fact that the attendance will be the largest and most representative yet, and the population of the thriving little town at the confluence of the Bulkley and Telkwa rivers for the day will likely figure in the thousands.

Energetic committees have been working for weeks on the plans and arrangements which have now reached a point as near perfection as possible. They have now a great program prepared which will include stock show, games of all sorts, field events, horse races, grand ball and other numerous attractions. The attendance will doubtless ensure the financial success of the Barbecue. But there was another question that presented more difficulties to the committee than either the preparation of a program or the financing of the day and that was the providing of accommodations for the visitors. In the past, that has been the one and only uncomfortable feature of the Barbecue as far as the visitors were concerned. They found themselves facing the night in Telkwa where it was hard enough to obtain even meals, not to speak of lodgings. This is to be remedied to a large extent this year, however. Special eating places have been provided and the people are opening every available bed for the accommodation of their visitors for the night. The hotel will not be able to handle all the crowds that is certain.

Leaves Tomorrow.

Prince Rupert people should remember that if they are going to the Barbecue they will have to go on tomorrow morning's train as Monday's does not reach until late in the evening when everything will be over with the exception of the big dance. Quite a few, it is understood, are going for there is not a better opportunity than this to see the people of the Bulkley and find out what they are doing and the great strides that have been made in the country in the past few years.
