Lecture by Dr. Evans Was Replete with Humor and Highly Instructive.

Possibly the most humorous and interesting lecture of the series during the Chautauqua was that last night by Dr. Arthur Walwyn Evans. It was humorous in the extreme and clever. As a lecture it was nothing like as lucid or as eloquent as that of Mr. Innie but as an entertaining feature it was first rate.

In opening Dr. Evans spoke of the influence of childhood in forming the habits and customs of the people. The surroundings of childhood were indelibly impressed hence the need of in-shilling in the young people the patriotic spirit.
