**40,000 AUTOMOBILES REGISTERED ALBERTA**

EDMONTON, Sept. 3.—In the number of automobiles in operation Alberta steadily forges ahead without regard to crop failures in some localities and generally low prices for farm produce, to say nothing of declared dull times in the towns and cities.

This year will see the number of car licenses issued by the provincial government exceed the 40,000 mark by some distance. Already the sales of license plates has gone beyond 39,000 according to incomplete returns made to the provincial registrar in this city and there are still four months of the year left. While the demand for licenses naturally declines rapidly in the autumn the records of previous years make it certain that the 1921 total will be in excess of 40,000, a new record for Alberta in this particular.

**SOON TO TALK WITH EDMONTON BY WIRELESS**

EDMONTON, Sept. 3.—Edmonton and Prince Rupert should soon be in direct communication by wireless, if present plans are carried out. Bert L. Perry, electrical contractor of this city has just been granted a federal license to erect and operate a commercial station here, primarily for the purpose of keeping in direct communication with the oilfields of the north. It will also be able to communicate with other parts of the country including the Pacific Coast.

Work on the new station is to start at once. It will be erected in the environs of the city and far enough away from the city power plant to avoid interference. It is expected to have the system in operation by the spring.

**SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS**

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre, second class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and to no one person or persons.

Particular pre-emption abolished.

Interest of not more than four months arranged for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on his respective land.

Pre-emptors must occupy station for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least one-half acre.

Where pre-emptor is in occupation less than 2 years, and has made one portion improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, or other cause, or death, or removal from the country, or removal of his wife, or transfer of his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be used, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of one-half acre, and occupies the same for two years.

Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvement of one-half acre, cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Unsurveyed areas to be opened up, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding \$10 acres may be leased for 20 years.

Mill, factory or industrial building on timber land not exceeding 10 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stampage.

Natural gas or oil fields, inaccessible to existing roads, may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due to solicitors by settlers on pre-emption recorded after Aug. 1, 1918. Fees are remitted for 5 years.

Provision for return of moneys advanced, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, etc., for pre-emption and land.

Interest on amounts to be charged town or city lots held by members of armed forces, or due or acquired direct or indirect, remitted from an interest to March 31, 1920.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces.

The lands which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, to three years, until after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due to solicitors by settlers on pre-emption recorded after Aug. 1, 1918. Fees are remitted for 5 years.

Provision for return of moneys advanced, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, etc., for pre-emption and land.

Interest on amounts to be charged town or city lots held by members of armed forces, or due or acquired direct or indirect, remitted from an interest to March 31, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS**

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, unless such persons are bona fide buyers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

**GRAZING ACT**

Grazing Act is made for systematical development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on unimproved, grazed, for established owners. Stockmen may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

**HIGH CHURCH AGAINST UNION**

Editorial in *The Church Times* States Case for Anglicans.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—(Canadian Press)—Canadians may be interested in the British High Anglican view of the union of the churches movement as it is presented from Canada. "The Church Times," the English journal of the High Church party devotes a long editorial to the subject. It regards the future union of Presbyterians, Methodists and Independents to constitute "the United Church of Canada" as a scheme to which the three communities are too deeply committed to draw back, and it evidently rather fears that the efforts being made to bring a fourth partner, the Anglican church, may be successful. "High Churchmen in Canada," it says, "are few and weak; if necessary they can be eliminated or ignored. Interchange of pulpits is already going on, and we notice that the newly-elected Moderator of the Presbyterian Assembly preached the other day in St. Paul's, Toronto, by invitation of Dr. Cody, who had the refusal recently of the see of Melbourne. The event, it seems, had been well advertised beforehand, and brisk journalists stated next morning that history was made last night. The Moderator preached what is called a simple and old-fashioned sermon on sin and salvation, which is good to hear; but the usual argument for interchange of pulpits is rather that preachers instead of concealing their denominational beliefs, should frankly explain them to the congregations of other bodies."

**Warms of Danger.**

And then "The Church Times" proceeds to warn and advise those whom it believes to be in danger, saying:

Now, if Canadian Churchmen merely regard themselves as members of one of the Protestant sects, only retaining certain features of antiquity, they had better cease from coy pour parlers, at once, negotiate openly with the Presbyterians, Methodists, Congregationalists and Baptists of their country, and bid farewell to Catholic Christendom. If they are bent on a superficial amalgamation with bodies of Christians who repudiate the essentials of Catholicism, they will, we warn them, find themselves isolated and alone. The popular view through the Anglo-Saxon world no doubt is, that a variety of Christian Churches happen to differ on certain not very vital questions of the form of Church Government, on unimportant ceremonies and minor parts of doctrine.

Why should they not agree to differ, waive these non-essential peculiarities, most of which have only an antiquarian significance, and unite as one church on the things that really matter? But is this the view of the situation taken by Canadian Churchmen themselves? Or are they prepared, humbly but firmly, to assert for the bishops of the Catholic Church, their own being an integral part of it, a

Divine apostolicity and jurisdiction, for the Catholic Ministry an authoritative priesthood and "character," for the Catholic sacraments covenanted validity and for the Catholic inheritance of doctrine and worship a supernatural guidance and grace? In such an awful claim there need be no hard or harsh denial of heavenly blessings on other ministrations—on those of the Quaker preacher any more than on those of the Wesleyan. Much of our disunion, and much erroneous belief and practice is inherited. Nevertheless, it is this claim alone which entitles the Church of England, or any of its daughter Churches, to exist.
