TELEGRAPH LINES HAVE BEEN DOWN

Now Working Again and Handling all Business Offering.

The storm on Tuesday night badly damaged the telegraph lines in the neighborhood of Dorreen between Pacific and Kitwanga. On Wednesday practically no news came through on the wire and the local newspapers showed it. Yesterday the Grand Trunk Pacific had one wire which handled all the railway and local business and also got through a budget of news mostly of the previous day.

Last night some news came through by wireless and today both lines are again functioning and doing business as usual.

FISH ARRIVALS

Three Big Schooners Sold Their Catches This Morning—Total, 162,000 Pounds.

There was 162,000 pounds of halibut marketed at the Fish Exchange this morning. It was mostly all from three large schooners and sold around the 12c mark.

Pioneer, 37,000 pounds; Thelma, 4000 pounds, and Hippo, 2,500 pounds, sold to the Royal Fish Co. at 12.1c and 5c.

Torberg, 1000 pounds sold to the Casadian Fish and Cold at 13c and 5.5c.
