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BIRTH CONTROL IS DISCUSSED

England Aroused Over Utterances of Lord Dawson, the King's Physician.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The British people are all discussing birth control. Lord Dawson, personal physician to King George, has come out boldly advocating it and his utterances have aroused a sharp division of opinion, some in praise and others in severe condemnation. The interest of the general public was largely stirred by the relation of his subject to the present problems of unemployment, and such suggestions as Lord Northcliffe's that immigration to Australia is the only solution for Australia's problem, as well as that confronting England.

Lord Dawson, however, does not believe in carrying control to the point of race suicide either with reference to the race or the individuals concerned. "Maternity gives woman her most beautiful attributes," he said, but he savagely attacked the moral basis of the Lambeth conference resolution which held that sexual relationship as an end in itself was inseparable from procreation.

Storm Rages.

visaged love as invertebrate and joyless," he said. "Who can associate in his mind what the Lambeth conference called deliberate and thoughtful self-control with the ardent passion which everyone admits is a part of true love." Birth control by abortion, said the King's physician is either ineffective, or if effective is pernicious to health and happiness and today a storm rages around his head. Generally speaking physicians, publicists and social workers back up Lord Dawson's theories, while churchmen are reluctant to abandon the basis of their age old teaching.

"Truths Needed Telling."
In reviewing the matter Sir W. Arbuthnot Lane, a Harley street surgeon said: "I congratulate Lord Dawson for telling the truths that badly needed telling in the open, although all reasonable people have accepted them in private. It is one of the most valuable things he has done in his life. The times are favorable for such a pronouncement. Since the war the public has become much broader minded and more and more evil and hypocrisy is being rent."

Bishop's Opinion.
The Bishop of Guildford, Dr. Randolph, typifies the opposite opinion. In speaking of Lord Dawson's statement that a mother and father with only one or two children ought to be appealed to to have more in order to benefit the country's, the Bishop said: "If you are going to introduce motives of patriotism, where are you going to stop?" He disagreed with Lord Dawson's narrow reading of the Lambeth resolution, but concluded that in each case it was a matter of individual conscience while the church must teach that children are the primary end of marriage according to divine law.

Siding with the churchmen was a medical officer of health in the city of Birmingham, Dr. Roberts, who declared that large families always were the happiest.

FRIENDSHIP OF BRITAIN AND AMERICA NEED

Stephen Leacock Gives Notable Address to British-American Union at Oxford.

OXFORD, Eng., Nov. 3.—(By Associated Press).—Dr. Stephen Leacock, head of the department of political economy in McGill University at Montreal, told the members of the British-American Union in an address here Friday evening that the British and American peoples should have a better knowledge of each other, maintain more sympathetic personal relations, if a British-American union, without pledge or compact, is to become a fact.

He declared that the time for a "parliament of man" and "federation of the world" was not yet. "The League of Nations, though it may contain within it seeds of future concord, cannot serve as yet as a shield against aggression and injustice," he affirmed. "The principal hope of the world is to be sought in the continued friendship of Britain and America."

Peace or Ruin.
"The vast communities of people gathered under the British and American flags represent an organization of power easily superior to any force that could conceivably be brought against it. Where these two nations lead, the world must follow. Peace and war lie in their hands. On the other hand, disagreement between Britain and America spells ruin—not only for themselves but for the world. So great is the power of each that war between them could mean nothing but mutual destruction. Neither could conquer; both must fall."

"The efforts of every honest citizen should be bent towards the maintenance of peace relations and mutual understanding. There is no question here of union in the narrower sense, of federation in its organic form. A century and a half ago it might have been. But the page is written and cannot be blotted out."

Sympathy Not Symbols.
"But for the more real form of union there is still ample need and opportunity. The basis is there in a common speech, a common literature and a common tradition. To a great extent the tie of a common descent still holds. The union that is needed is not one that is contrived with pen and ink and written on a scrap of paper, but the union that reflects an understanding and a common purpose, a union of sympathy and not of symbols."

"To my thinking the best and truest means of union is to be sought in enlightenment. Our quarrels in the past have arisen from our lack of knowledge of one another, our inability, through ignorance, to share one another's point of view. For this the remedy is better knowledge. The more we can interchange our thoughts the more certain are we of agreement. As far as possible, we should seek to share one another's ideas through books, through the press, through the drama."

"We should facilitate in every way the sympathetic relations of our great universities. Harvard should come to Oxford, and Oxford in return should come and sit among the elm trees of Cambridge, in Massachusetts, listening. There should be between Britain and America a constant and perpetual interchange, a sort of tidal ebb and flow, of all that makes for scholarship and literature. Much is already done. But much remains. In business, men have long since found out that the personal relation is everything. We must apply the same to our political relations. We must not rely upon conclaves of cabinets and congressmen. We must know one another. In the face of such knowledge ill-will will vanish, and British-American union, without bond or pledge or contract, will become a fact."

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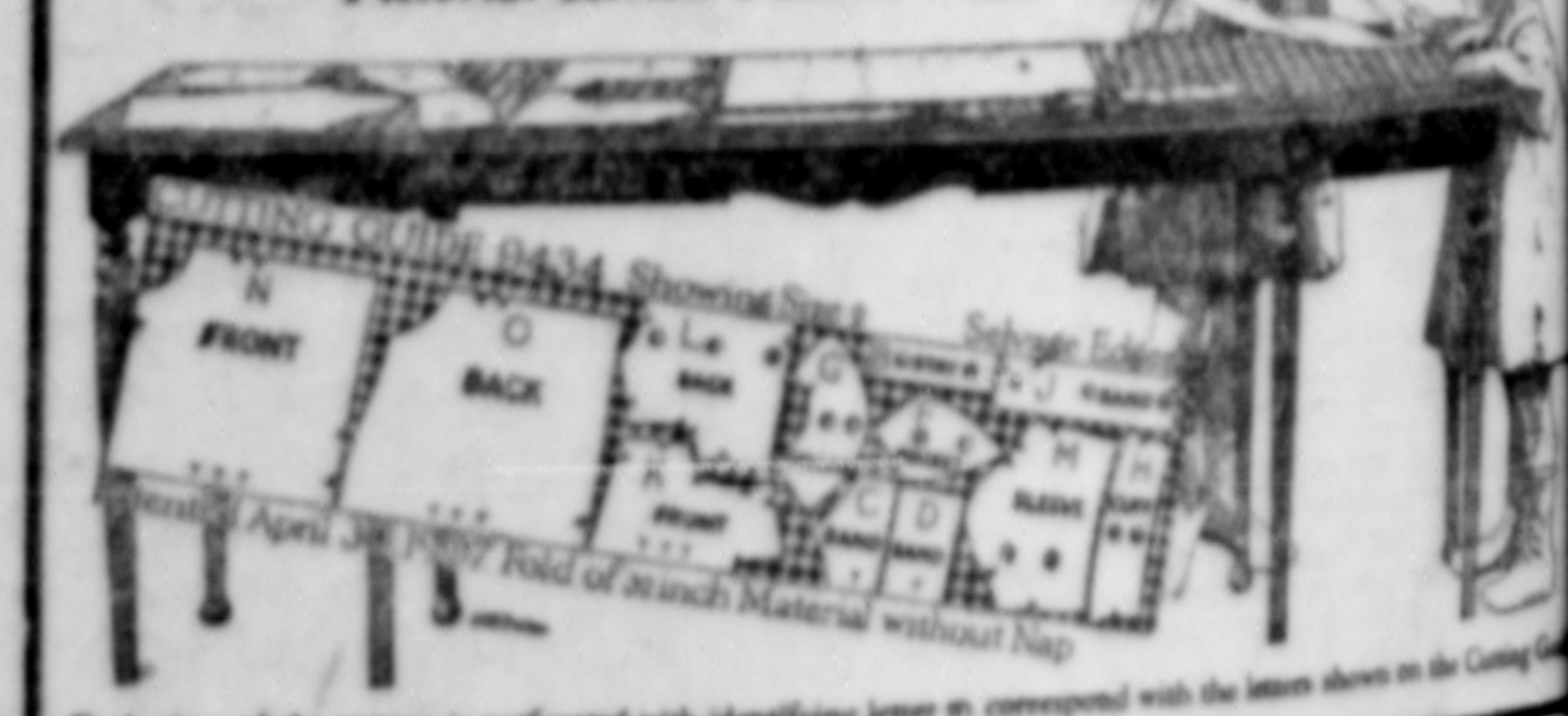
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
