#### Hospital Day To Be Celebrated.

A National Hospital Day has been set for the 101st anniversary of Florence Nightingale, which falls on May 12. The day is being celebrated everywhere with the object of drawing special attention to the work done by the hospitals with a view to closer co-operation between the public and the institutions.

In Prince Rupert there is a very worthy institution excellently conducted and the people of Prince Rupert will be asked to consider the splendid work it is doing, especially in connection with the day set aside as hospital day.

"The day is intended to be one of widespread hospital propaganda, which will establish greater interest, greater co-operation and stimulation for better service. The program for the day is left to each individual hospital to arrange as it sees fit, but several suggestions have been put forth by the committee, many of which will be carried out in Vancouver," says the Daily Province.

"Some of these are—that the various hospitals have 'open day' to the public so that they can see through the institution in this day various functions for the hospital, as, nurses' graduation exercises, balls, dances, teas, etc.; that the various clubs and organizations during the week of May 12 celebrate the day of devoting time at their meetings to addresses on hospital affairs; that the ministers refer to the work of the hospitals from the pulpits the Sunday previous; that the theatres assist in the propaganda by slides and movies; that the hospitals distribute descriptive pamphlets of their work and service; that the merchants decorate their windows accordingly, and many other features to make it a real day."

#### Britain Reduces Her War Debt.

In spite of her domestic difficulties Great Britain is paying off her war debt. Press despatches announce that she is already clear with Japan, Argentine, Holland and Spain and that large sums have been paid to United States and Canada. This is a most encouraging condition and one that gives hope for the future. If Britain can do that, surely it should be an easy matter for Canada to grapple with her financial situation and deal with it intelligently and effectively. National credit is most important to a nation and British credit has almost always been good. It is time Canada was restoring the condition of her currency and establishing her credit once more so that she may be able to deal with the United States on equal terms.

#### Debased Currency Has Its Value.

While those of us who buy have to suffer from the poor condition of Canadian currency and the adverse balance of trade, there are compensations. Take the position of Anyox as an example. It is the discrepancy in the matter of currency that makes it possible for the smelter and mine there to operate, at the present price of copper. There is a margin in favor of the producer on this side to the extent of from twelve to fifteen per cent. This enables the smelters on this side of the line to make a profit while the smelters on the other side are shut down. It militates against the employees but it is better for them to have work, even at the low rate of wages, than for the smelter to be closed and those who have homes there to be obliged to leave.

#### Commence Permanent Road Building.

The Board of Works recommends to the City Council that two streets of the city be graded instead of replanked. This looks like a sensible policy. We cannot always live here with planked streets and the sooner we get down to permanent work the better it will be for the place. Eventually all the streets will have to be graded and it is time the work was begun.

### BAND SMOKER AND CONCERT

Great Success Scored by Great War Veterans' Association Last Night.

Unqualified success attended the smoker held in the Empress Theatre last night by the Great War Veterans' Association in aid of the newly-formed band. The hall was filled with an audience that was highly satisfied with the entertainment that had been afforded. There was a long program of music, recitations, dancing and boxing but the feature of it all was the presence of the band which did itself credit. Refreshments and smokes were kept flowing in generous style during the whole of the evening.

J. H. Kelly, president of the association, was the chairman of the concert. After making a few introductory remarks he called upon the band under Bandmaster Greenfield, which played in excellent manner the old favorite, "Colonel Bogey" march. Through out the evening the selections of the band were greeted with great applause and encores demanded on every occasion.

The first half of the program included several splendid songs and recitations. R. Robertson sang "My Old Woman," and in response to the demands of the audience encoered with "I'll Never Forget the Day," Principal J. G. Brady recited "Gungah Din" and "The Old Groggman" and Bandmaster Greenfield, accompanied by the band, rendered "I'll We Meet Again" as a cornet solo. A step dance by J. Stewart proved a popular number and Ed. Ross was, as usual, well received, his songs being "The Bonnie, Bonnie Heather" and "The Belts of Eeefeechan." A punch ball exhibition by Chris. Stapleton was, as well carried out as it was clever.

This section of the program was concluded with the staging of an estaminet scene recalling to mind the way many of the boys celebrated when on leave for a day or so in some French village. Although only rehearsed once this number was splendidly carried off and was characterized by the natural manner in which the various men taking part conducted themselves. There were many ludicrous incidents and the antics of the carefree soldiers kept the audience in continual laughter. Among the prominent characters were Ed. Ross, J. Westwood, Sid Thompson, S. L. Warrior, W. H. Waldorf and Algie Hunter.

The second half of the program was opened with a solo by William Murray, "The Shamrock, Thistle and Rose," encoered with "Memories." G. S. Fitzmaurice was well received in his reading of Robert W. Service's "Soulful Sam," from the Rhymes of a Red Cross Man. Bert McEvoy gave a step dance which was followed with a quartette by members of the band.

The boxing event was the staging of a four-round no-decision bout between Red Davidson and Tommy Sherman. There was little action in this except in the last round when the boys expended a little. Davidson did the most of the leading out and kept open all the time, while Sherman showed a tendency to close up, keeping his head down and protected all the way. Roi Barnes was the referee.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
