## CITY ADMINISTRATION

"Immediate action by the city council is required, without waiting for next year. It is imperative that the cost of the civic administration be reduced by a very considerable sum. Every service that is not absolutely necessary will have to be dropped and others will have to be severely curtailed. The city cannot come through with a clean sheet without doing so. The drastic retrenchment should begin right now, because the failure to do so simply means laying up greater trouble for next year."

No, this does not refer to the Prince Rupert city finances but to the city of Winnipeg, the quotation being from the Free Press of that city. The city is rapidly running behind financially and the controller announced that there will be a large adverse balance at the end of the year.

## SPEECH FROM THRONE

There does not seem to have been anything very outstanding in the speech read at the opening of Parliament yesterday by Lord Bessborough and prepared for him by Premier Bennett and the other members of the cabinet. Holding over the bank charters for a year simply indicates that there will be revisions in the Bank Act before the charters are extended the usual ten years. What those revisions may be, it is impossible to say just yet.

Railways, ratification of the work of the Imperial conference, unemployment relief, none of these are new, subjects but they are vital.

## CROWNING ACHIEVEMENT

The British Conservatives look upon the Imperial conference as the "crowning achievement of a wonderful year." Probably it was. It certainly was an important event and the year has been a wonderful one in Great Britain where the country has set out definitely on a period of industrial improvement.

# TOLD ABOUT PRISON LIFE IN GERMANY

F. S. Walton Related How He Man-  
aged to Escape and Attempt to  
Form Irish Brigade

One of the features of an address given by F. S. Walton at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday afternoon, George Munro presiding, was the account of how the Germans tried to form an Irish brigade at Lemberg prison camp.

According to Mr. Walton, the Irish Catholics were separated from the other prisoners and they were persuaded, cajoled, threatened but with no effect. Then Sir Roger Casement and his wife would come and lecture to them but Casement never went where anyone could get at him. Later he was captured by the British and hanged.

Mr. Walton also read from a circular that was sent around inviting the men to fight for Ireland, not for Germany. They were promised if they did so that they would be enlisted under the Irish flag, serve under Irish officers, wear green uniforms and if they wished at the close of the war they would be sent to the United States. All these efforts had little effect, for very few, if any, joined the regiment.

The speaker then told of one of his efforts to escape. He was away from the prison camp four days and was near the border when he was retaken and sent back. The punishments given them and other incidents of the life were told about.


At the close Mr. Walton was thanked for his address on behalf of the members.

No. 651 is shown above.




