### General Hospitai Needs an Ambulance.

An ambulance is needed badly at the General Hospital. More than that it will be necessary to have a driver who will be on duty all the time at a moment's notice. The ambulance will be expensive and the upkeep with a driver will cost even more. What is to be done about it? Are we, because of difficulties, to allow injured people to suffer untold agonies in conducting them to the hospital, when by securing an ambulance this could be

avoided? The suggestion has been made that an ambulance might be kept in connection with the fire department, and it is possible that something might be worked out along those lines. Without were the worked out along those lines. any expert information it might seem as if a combined chemical apparatus and ambulance might be secured to be used by the fire chief for hurried calls to fires where an application of the chemical would stop a fire in its earlier stages and also for the few rush calls that come for carrying injured or sick people to the hospital. This may not be practicable but it looks as if it might. In many cities the chief has a small chemical apparatus attached to his car with which he takes the first step in quelling a fire. To arrange also for carrying patients on the same car may be more difficult, but possibly not insuperable. At anyrate this is the time to consider the ambulance question and to act on it promptly. 
