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
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Voice of B. C.

Is Heard.

The voice of British Columbia was unmistakeably heard in the House of Commons in the debate and voting on the Oriental question on Monday night when all thirteen members from the province, regardless of party affiliations, voted solidly for strict Oriental exclusion. It was one of those cases where party polities was thrown to the winds in the support of a principle, the necessity for which is ever making itself more apparent in this province. British Columbia, the province most effected by Oriental penetration, through its members, has shown its feeling clearly as a result of that vote.

#### Analysis Of The Vote.


It is apparent that the East does not yet see the necessity for stringent Oriental measures. The fact that only 36 votes were registered in favor of the McQuarrie resolution indicates that. I these 36, thirteen were from the province of British Columbia Another one is accounted for in Hon. Arthur Meighen who is removed as having spoken in favor of the British Columbia resolution. The remaining 22, it may be assumed, were Conservalives who would support the resolution through the recommendation and example of their chief. Liberals and Farmers of the East, it is likely although the details of the vote have not yet come to hand, voted for the government amendment for federal restriction.

Even if the more drastic measure of exclusion was not adopted the government, as a whole, doubtless realizes the necessity for some action. Otherwise the Stewart amendment never would have been advanced and the McQuarrie resolution while walking on Third Avenue would have been allowed to go to the vote for or against and this morning. ## BIG PARTY OF TEACHERS TO COME JULY 5

Special Train Will Arrive Here With Pedagogues From Eastern Canada and States

One hundred and twenty-five school teachers from eastern and central United States and Canada vill arrive in this city on the evening of July 5 in the course of an excursion tour of Western Canada which is to be run over, the Canadian National railways, according to information received at the office of G. A. McNicholl, assistant general freight and passenger agent, which is planning for their routing and reception here.

The special train, on which the teachers will arrive, will comprise five sleepers, an observation car, a diner and the necessary baggage cars. The latest advice received is that this train will be augmented by another two special cars of teachers and friends from Duluth, Minnesota, which will join the other train at Winnipeg.


