DEATH FOLLOWS CUP OF COFFEE

Indian Medicine Said to Have
Been Given Man by His
Wife.

EDMONTON, April 12.—Coffee drugged with Indian medicine, said to have been given to him by his wife for breakfast, is believed to be the cause of the death of Bryan Printup, whose body was brought to the University of Alberta that the contents of the stomach might be analyzed, if possible, to determine the exact nature of the drug used.

Meagre information contained in a telegram from Constable Moses, to the headquarters of the provincial police here, states that the man died near Heart Lake on the way to the Lac la Biche Thursday night, and that before he passed away he said that he drank coffee made and given to him by his wife for breakfast, which he believed had contained some kind of Indian medicine. It is added that there has been considerable trouble between him and his wife for some time past.

Constable Moses also states that the man bled profusely as the result of cuts sustained when he collapsed and fell forward on his face soon after drinking the coffee.

Whatever kind of drug was used it had the almost immediate effect of stiffening the man's legs and arms rendering him helpless and causing a lingering death. The man did not die

**FISHERMEN WRECKED
IN LAKE ERIE STORM**

Two Men Lost But Dog Escapes and Returns to His Home.

PORT DOVER, April 12.—Archie Edmondson and Govey Rankin left here in their sailing boat to set nets near Wolfe's Point. They were accompanied by Rankin's dog, and next morning at 9 o'clock this faithful friend of his master came whining to the door of his home, soaking wet and exhausted. Search expeditions were organized, and east of Fisher's Glen the wreck of the boat was found with the body of one of the occupants, Rankin, lashed to the thwart. No hope is held for the recovery of Edmondson, and thus the dog remains the sole living witness of a tragedy of a Lake Erie storm.

An easterly gale sprang up after the departure of the two fishermen. Alarmed at the continued absence of the men—an alarm that was increased when the dog returned home—all the local tugs went out, but the storm baffled their search.

Captain Duncan MacDonald set out with the Jean F. and patrolled the north shore under

Ryerson's Island in an unsuccessful search for the missing boat. He returned three hours later with all the forward glass in the tug smashed by the heavy seas.

A beach patrol was on the point of setting out along the shore, when information was received that searchers east of Fisher's Glen had discovered the boat and one occupant lashed to it.

The boat was a staunch little craft, but the storm proved too much for it. Rankin had died from exhaustion, while it is evident his companion was washed overboard by the heavy seas.

WEALTHY WOMAN LEFT A LARGE FORTUNE

NEW YORK April 12—More evidence that Mrs. Sarah J. Wyckoff Bent, who died a few months ago in her home in The Bronx, well earned her title of "the shrewdest woman operator in Wall Street," has been unearthed.

Temporary administrators of her estate, going to one of several safe deposit boxes rented by her, discovered more than a million dollars' worth of jewels and securities. This discovery led the administrators to estimate her entire fortune at more than \$3,500,000. Although she was credited with being wealthy, even her most intimate friends did not know the amount she had piled up during her years on the street. During the panic of 1907, when steel dropped almost out of sight, she bought heavily and made half a million dollars.
