

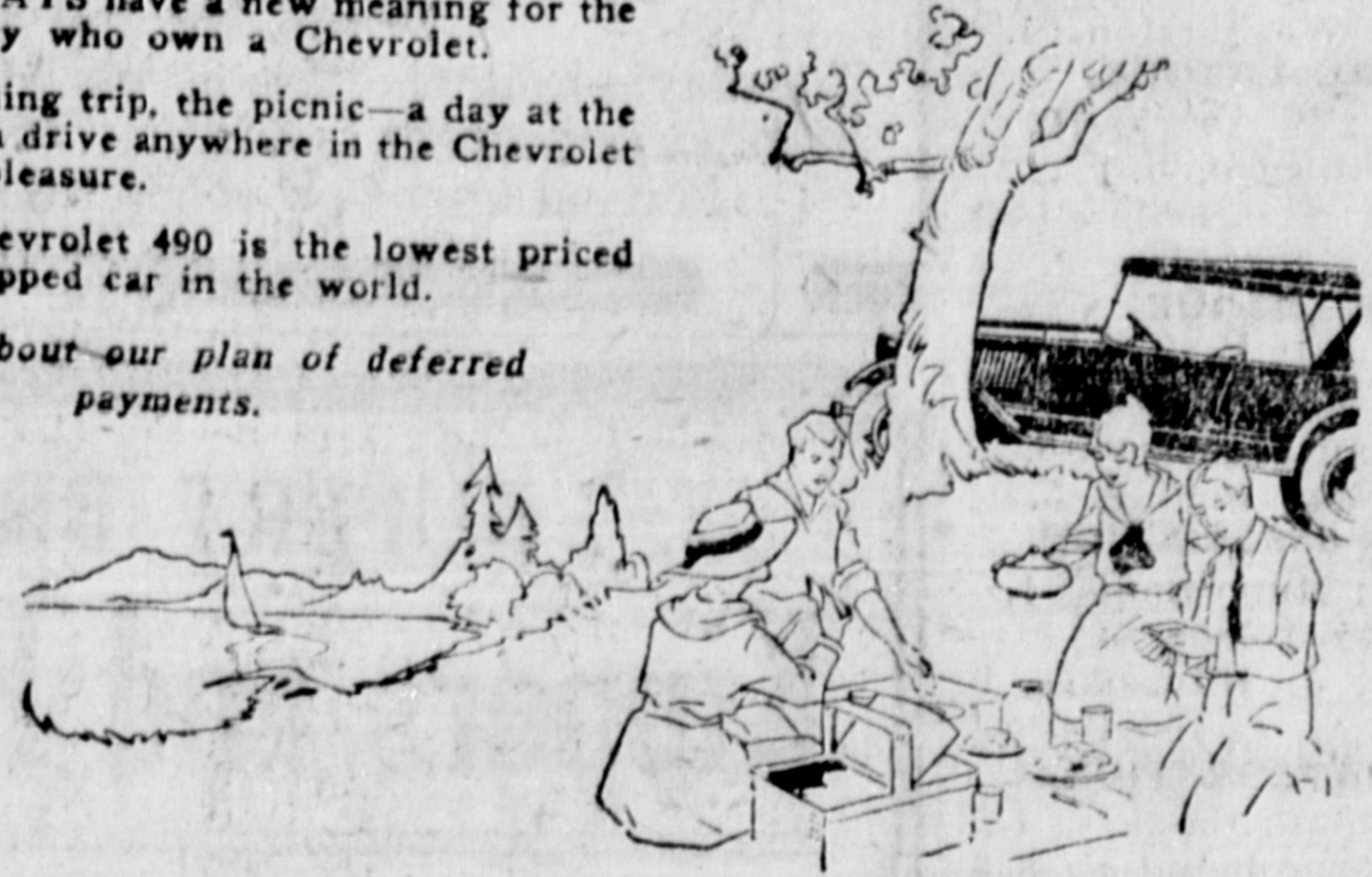

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Sport Chat

The season's schedule of the Juvenile Baseball League, under the management of W. J. Cash, will commence next Friday night at the Seventh Street grounds. Last Friday night a practice game was played between the Midgets and the Falcons, the latter winning by a score of 17 to 6. There will be another practice game tonight. Organization of the Junior League is also under way and although the program has not been rounded out yet it is assured that there will be an interesting series in this division as well. The season's schedules for both leagues will be announced in the near future.

It is hoped to have three teams enrolled this season in both the Juvenile and Junior Leagues. In the former, two teams, the Falcons and Midgets, are already organized. In the Junior League the White Sox and Tiny Tims have come forward. It is possible that the Boy Scouts may furnish the third teams in either league. The complexion of the line-ups, it is reported, is going to be considerably altered from last season.

More than the Scots were surprised at the result of Friday night's football game when the Grotto obtained a 4 to 2 win over the Gallies. Many close followers of the soccer game had it figured out that the Gallies and Sons of England were the two teams most likely for championship honors this season but the work of the Grotto's last week rather upsets that hope and they themselves have now come into the limelight. As it is now, the Sons of Canada and the Sons of England each have one victory chalked up to their credit while the Grotto has a win and a loss and the Gallies two losses. So it may be anybody's championship as far as results so far this season are concerned. The game tonight between the Sons of Canada and the Sons of England should be an interesting affair. Whichever team wins will be indisputably at the top of the League and will have won quite an advantage.

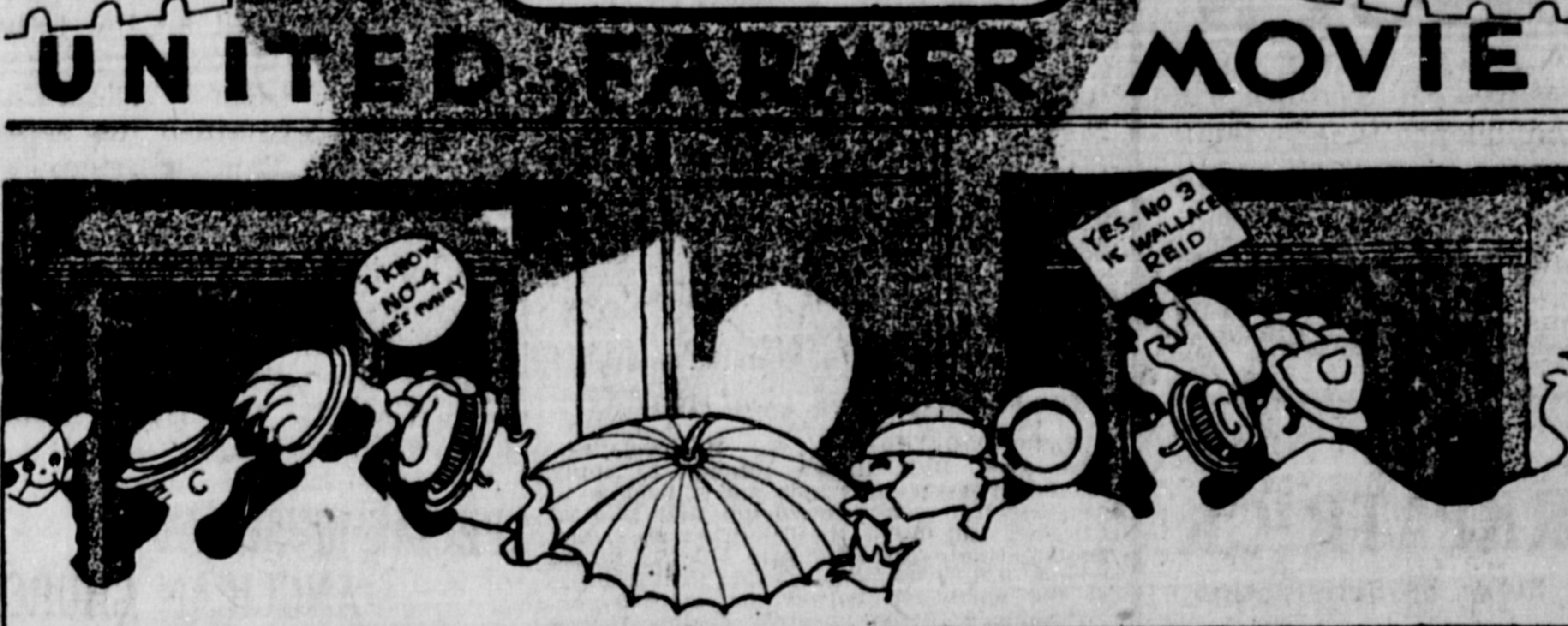

MINES SECRETS OF NORTHERN WILDS

Prospector in Victoria After Family Search for Gold—17 Years in Unknown Plateaux.

NATURAL OIL ROUTE BY PORTLAND CANAL

Seventeen years' effort in the wilderness, hunger and exposure and now the eye of success, such is the story of Frank Perry, explorer and miner, who told something of the romance of his life in a Victoria Times representative while in Victoria last week, a guest at the Empress Hotel.

Perry has the physique of steady manhood, and the bronzed appearance of the man who lives close to nature. He has battled with the elements, and traversed the unknown waste spaces of northern British Columbia for many years seeking a good gold location which would warrant capital going in the development of a scale commensurate with the effort.

Found Many Things.

Wandering for many months without human companion, educating his dog team to give the best results, and facing stoically many rebuffs from Nature, Mr. Perry has found many other things beside mineral indications in the great spaces now shown with blank spaces or conjectural physical features on the maps. He has found many suitable farming areas, as yet too far removed from transportation, and also places where frost is almost unknown, owing to chemical agencies, in the form of hot springs, creating remarkable results.

Natural Oil Route.

As was to be expected, Mr. Perry discovered several instances of oil bearing formation. He states that the natural grade land via the Liard River, between the headwaters of the Finlay and the Dease, and westward to the Stikine, and thence to the Bulkley Canal, is the natural oil route for oil from the Fort St. John district, there being no elevations to cross in making the route to the Coast. Having thoroughly explored the country, he states that there should be no real physical obstacle in a route of that nature.

FIRE MARSHAL FOUND CENTRAL INTERIOR WAS HAVING BOOM

J. A. Thomas Returns to Vancouver After Spending Three Weeks in North.

"New settlers are pouring into the Bulkley Valley and other agricultural regions of Central British Columbia," stated J. A. Thomas, provincial fire marshal on his return to Vancouver last week, from an official organizing tour of the Grand Trunk Pacific country. "Every town, particularly Vanderhoof, Telkwa, Smithers and Terrace, has its quota of newcomers seeking homes or purchasing supplies and equipment for new homes just established.

"Scores of new buildings are going up in the various towns, and I know no part of the province where prosperity and development are more conspicuous present. At Lucerne, the topic of the hour is the squabble between Lucerne and Jasper as to which is to be the permanent

divisional point for the National Railway. One is the old divisional point of the C. T. P., the other of the Canadian Northern. The combined National system needs only one and Lucerne is putting up a strong fight against the Alberta town.

Fire Districts Defined.

"Lucerne was apparently having the best of the argument until a week or two ago when Jasper enlisted the support of the Edmonton Board of Trade. The day before I arrived the citizens of Lucerne had joined issue by taking up a collection of \$150 to send one of their number to the coast to enlist the support of the Vancouver Board of Trade and the provincial government." Fire districts were defined at Hazelton, Terrace, Smithers, Burns Lake, Vanderhoof, Endako, Telkwa, Fort George and Lucerne by Mr. Thomas on his three weeks' tour. Assistant fire marshals will be gazetted shortly. Mr. Thomas stated, The new officials will be charged with the responsibility of organizing volunteer fire brigades and with inspecting fire risks that imperil life and property.
