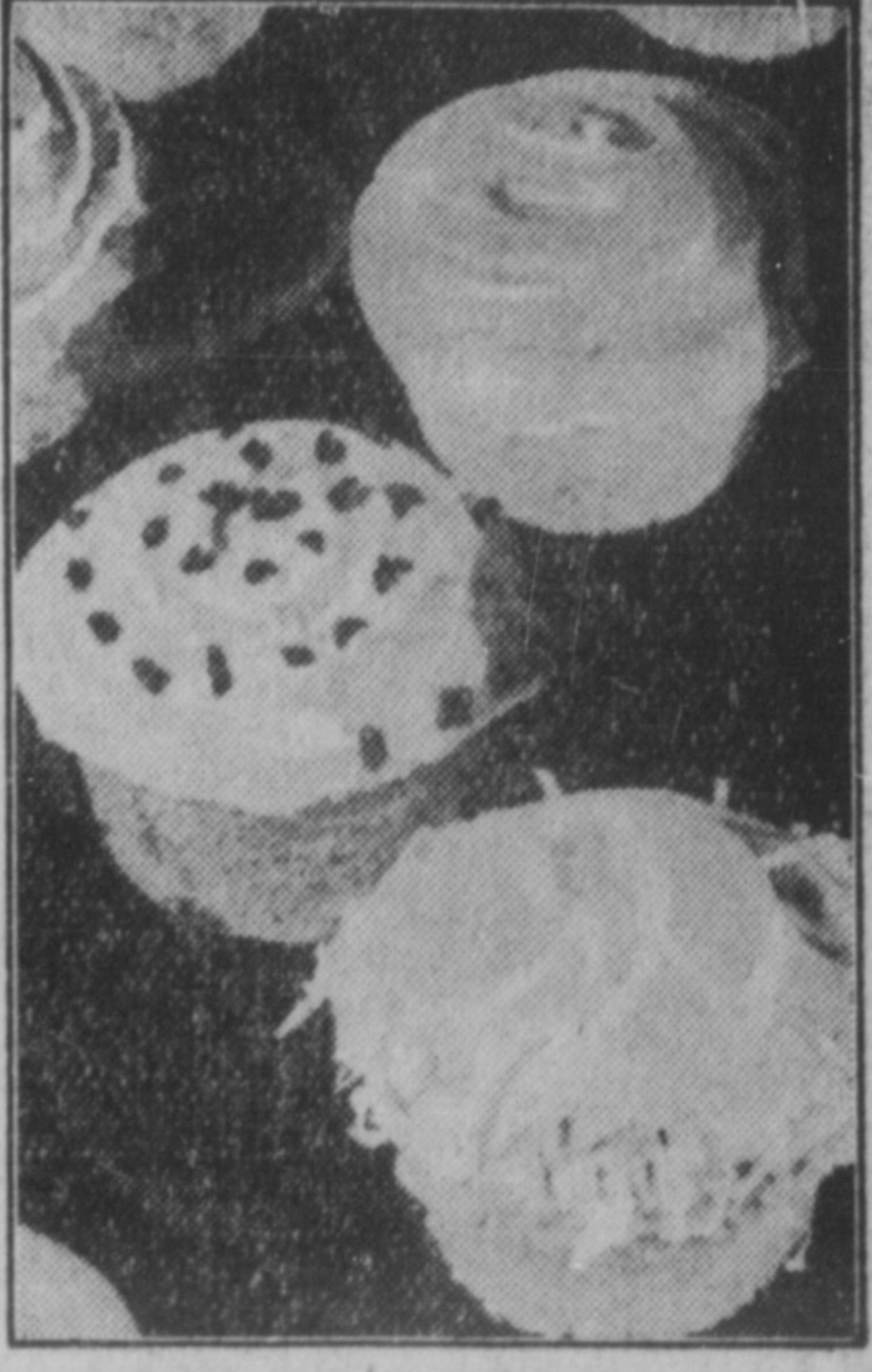

3/4 cup butter	2 cups pastry flour (or 1 1/2 cups bread flour)
1 cup sugar	2 eggs
3/4 teaspoon vanilla extract	3 teaspoons Magic Baking Powder
